unanimously agreed in Spain, have one immediate effect. And that is to hasten the marriage of the young King, Alfonso XIII. On account of the death of the princess the Spanish throne has no heir in the direct line. The Salie law does not exist in Spain, and as a con-

sequence the present crown prince of heir apparent is the eldest son of the young princess who has just died, and of Count Caserta-who is a Bourbon politan one at that. Now Spaniards are as jealous of the blueness of blood in the royal house as of that of their bulls, which is saying

a good deal. Circumstances then demand that the young King should marry at once and give the country a direct heir to the throne. The King's choice is virtually limited to four or five young princesses, any one of whom would be agreeable to his subiects.

These princesses are: One of the sisters of the Emperor of Germany; the daughter of the Duke of Connaught; the young Princess of Mecklenburg (who is the sister of the fiancee of the German Crown Prince), and her cousin, daughter of the Comtesse de Paris. Which of these princesse is destined to become the queen of Alfonso? The betting is even.
