

LAYMEN MUST DO THEIR SHARE

Christian Imperialism Is Needed for the Evangelization of the World.

DR. GANDIER'S ADDRESS

Mass Meeting Last Night in St. An drew's Church - Rev. Robert Johnston Also Speaks.

The urgency of the need for the evangelization of the world in this generation was the dominant note of the addresses in the mass meeting of men in connection with the Pan-Presbyterian Missionary Demonstration in St. Andrew's Church last evening. A very large audience was present and listened intently to the impassioned words of the speakers as they urged the need of devoted, consecrated work on the part of the church to take the story of Christ to those who

sit in darkness.
"There are three points that I would like to dwell on tonight," said Rev. Principal Gandier, in addressing the gathering, "the motive of the missionary propaganda, the urgency at the present time, and the methods leading to its consummation. Our motive is to crown our Jesus Lord of all-to put the crown upon his brow to uplift him. That is the great motive and impelling power of every Christian. Jesus is my king, I have enthrened him in my heart and having done so I desire to crown him Lord of all. He is the only rightful king; it is his by right pur-chased by his blood, and we long in-tensely to make it his in fact. And how can we rest till in every land they worship Christ and bow the knee to

him who died. Christian Imperialism.

"I think what we need today is : great Christian imperialism. Surely we been done about the matter, and I do citizens, cradled and trained in that outreaching spirit of the Briton, should such a project or not. The matter has have worthy visions of the empire that is to be the Christ's. I am afraid sometimes that we have not looked on missions as a great war of conquest but a sentimental thing, that could well be left for the women and children. But surely such a spirit of imperialism is a man's work. We sometimes look upon the imperialism of history with disfavor, and perhaps justly so, for there is only one empire that has the inherent right to worldwide expansion. For Jesus is the one Saviour and only Lord of All.


