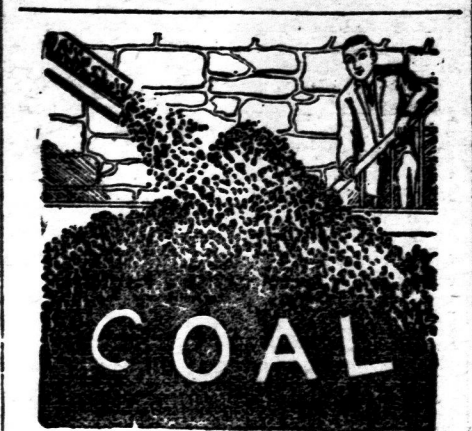

A horse belonging to Alex. Thompson, butcher, fell and broke its leg on Sunday night. It was destroyed by a policeman yesterday afternoon.

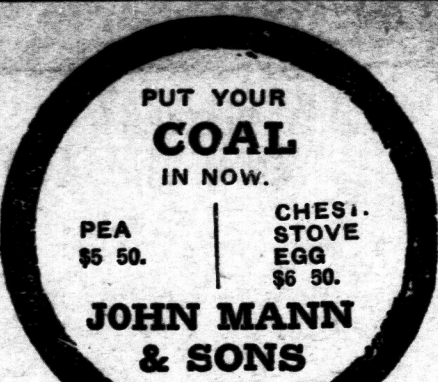
Lecture on Saul.

SEVENTH REGIMENT MADE FINE SHOWING

Marched to Tecumseh Park Last Night, Where Men Were Put Through Drill

The regular parade of the Seventh Regiment, held last night to Tecumseh Park, was splendidly attended, and the men went through a number of squad drills and battalion manoeuvres with a precision that delighted a very large crowd of citizens who went over the river to see them.

Several hundred of the men who are in training at camp also watched with great interest the drill, and many expressions of congratulation were heard among them at the fine showing the Seventh made.

Under command of Col. Campbell, outpost duty, advance guard, and skirmishing work was practiced, and the evening was brought to a close by a march past.

On returning to the Armouries Col. Campbell made the presentation of gold cuff links to each of the men who shot in the recent Daily Mail rifle competition, held at the Cove ranges.

Those who formed the Seventh rifle team, which shot, were Major McCrimmon, Captain Murphy, Sergt. Galbraith, Sergt. Butler, Sergt. Campbell and Pte. Allen, Lee and Kemp.

Col. Campbell stated to The Advertiser that a meeting will be held on Friday evening to discuss the final arrangements for the Dominion Day trip to Sarina.

SUEZ MADE MONEY

Last Year One of Most Prosperous in History of Canal.

London, June 13.—The last fiscal year has been the most profitable in the history of the Suez Canal. The receipts amounted to nearly \$25,000,000, due mainly to a revival of the Indian trade, notably from the ports of Bombay and Karachi.

Thanks to good Indian harvests, the exports of wheat and oleaginous grains of all sorts were so heavy as to require a large supplementary tonnage in the middle of the year, creating a remarkable movement of vessels in ballast from the Mediterranean.

This category of shipping reached the record figure of 671,000 tons.

Besides there has been a strong demand for freight in Manchuria to meet an entirely new traffic, the export to Europe of soya beans, which amounted to 440,000 tons. Australia, Japan, Burma and Indo-China also were large factors in the increase and the only diminution was in the trade from the Dutch East Indies arising from a restriction in the quantity of sugar exported to the United States and the cessation during the latter half of the year of the petroleum essence export. The decrease is considered to be only temporary.
