Pie shell? Baked under-crust ready for filling.

Bake pie shells over an inverted pie pan-thus avoiding the sides of the crust sinking into the middle. When baked, turn the pan over, put the baked crust in and fill.

Do not handle pie crust. Try to make pie by touching the crust no more than five times-once to place on board, again to fit in pan, again to put top crust on board, and again to put on pan. Press both crusts together with fork all the way round and cut off crust from pan.

A.-1. Apple Sauce Cake-11/2 cups apple sauce 1 cup sugar, 1 cup raisins, 32-cup shortening, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons soda, spice to taste. Cream Bud's address if she forwards it to butter and sugar and mix soda in me.




