

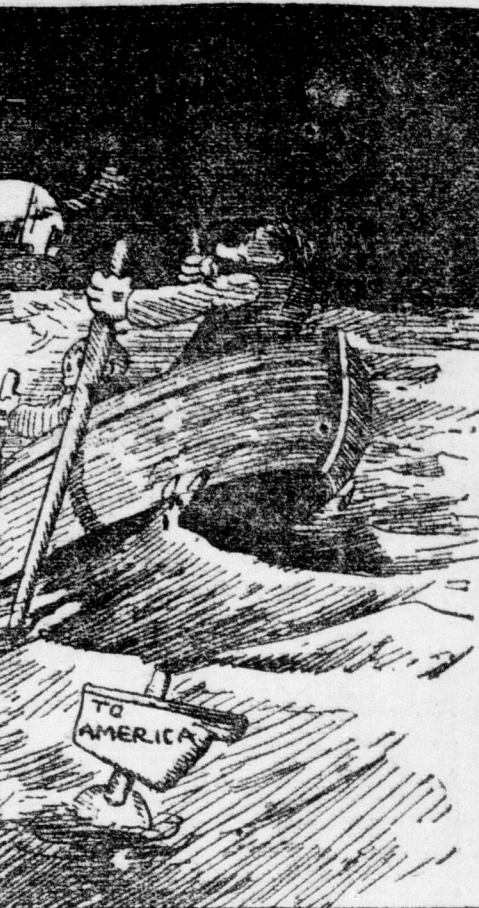
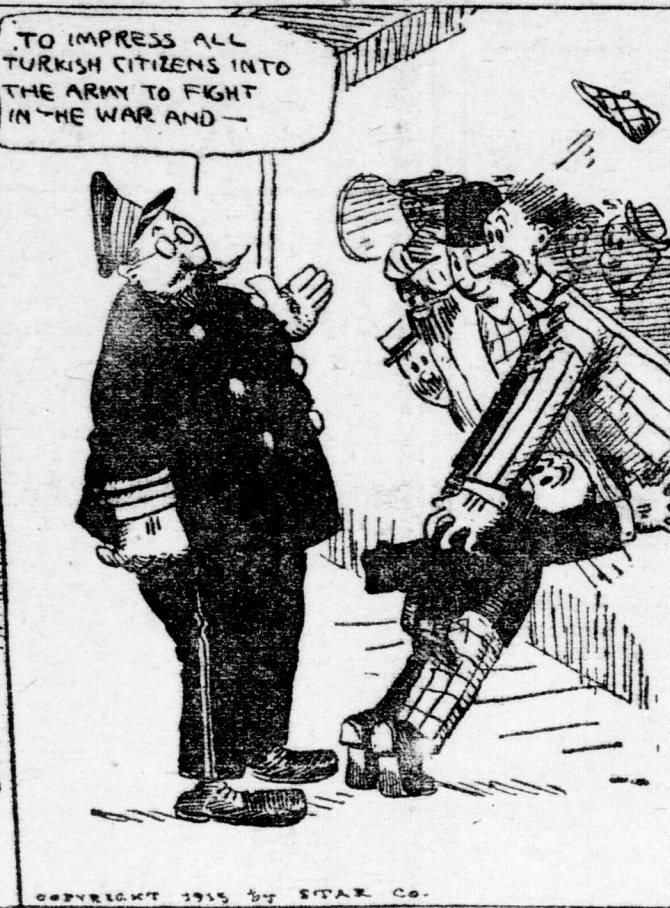

FATHER OF BILL BORLAND
HEARD NEWS IN WINNIPEG

Wired Local Hockey Club About Son's Injuries—Winnipeg Fans Send Regrets in Dispatch—London Player Is Recovering Nicely.

The old saw that bad news travels fast was demonstrated to the London Hockey Club management yesterday, when the report got around that Billy Borland was seriously injured and suffering from concussion of the brain as a result of the game at Paris Tuesday night. Secretary Vining received a telegram from Mr. A. F. Borland, father of the London player, whose home is in Winnipeg, anxiously asking if the report were true. A news dispatch had reached Winnipeg in which it was stated that Borland was badly hurt. Mr. Borland stated that he would come to London as soon as possible if his son was injured. However, Secretary Vining wired back and told him that there was no truth in the report and that Bill was getting

along fine. Borland is leaving the hospital today, fully recovered. To show how well-known Borland is in Winnipeg sport circles, the following special wire dispatch was received last evening by The Advertiser:

"Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 29, 1913. "Winnipeg hockey fans and Rugby enthusiasts regret to learn of Billy Borland's plight. He is well known in this city. Probably better in Rugby football than in hockey circles. "Two seasons ago he played with the Tigers Intermediate Rugby champions, and was heralded as a coming star. Last season he played for the London Rugby Club. "He is a brother of Claude Borland, and gave every promise here of developing into a player of the same caliber as the famous little rover."

PARIS AND WOODSTOCK TRIM

A Big Surprise Handed Out to Local Basketball Teams.

London's representatives in the O. B. A. were treated to a rude shock last evening when they were defeated by the Woodstock Juniors and Paris Intermediates. Quite a number of spectators gathered at the Y. M. C. A. to see the games, which were interesting and well played.

COMMISSION WILL
APPOINT ALL REFEREES

New York, Jan. 30.—The state athletic commission may take upon itself the assignment of referees for all boxing bouts in New York. This action was taken by the fraternity upon the suggestion of Ty Cobb, with the hearty endorsement of several other major league athletes, who wished to honor Evans for the various courtesies extended by him to his many friends of the diamond.

BRESNAHAN WILL BURY
HATCHET WITH MURPHY

Former Cardinal and Cub Boss Were Unfriendly Until Roger Signed With Cubs.

St. Louis, Jan. 29.—The peculiar part of the deal that takes Bresnahan to the Cubs is that Bresnahan and Murphy have been unfriendly for years, and only last winter Roger threatened to lick the Cubs' boss on the steps of the Waldorf Hotel in New York.

However, all these grievances have been forgotten.

"I would rather play with the Cubs than any team in the National League," said Bresnahan, "because I think they are the 1913 pennant winners. I did not accept Murphy's offer without thinking. It was the best I received. I believe I will have a chance to cut in on the world's series money. The Giants won't have it easy next year, and actually I look for the Cubs to fight it to the finish and win."

"Tell the fans in Chicago that I am not going there with any intention of becoming a manager. I will give Johnny Evers the best I have, and you know what that is. John is the grand little fellow, knows more of baseball, and I will hustle to the limit for him."

THORPE CHARGES WERE
NOT MADE IN TIME

Olympic Committee Cannot Accept Return of Cup Until Meeting Next Summer.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Jan. 30.—It will be impossible for the Olympic games authorities to accept the return of the prizes which James Thorpe won at the all-round championship at the games in Stockholm until the full Olympic committee meets in Lausanne next summer, according to advices received here from Stockholm. Charges that Thorpe played professional baseball, to which he confessed, should have been made within 30 days after the Olympic games, according to the rules of the Stockholm contests, in order to have such charges formally recognized. It is believed that the only way to have the prizes recalled is to have the American Amateur Athletic Union make a request to this effect at the next meeting of the Olympic committee.
