

BRITISH SHIPPERS ARE SUFFERING BECAUSE OF HEAVY EXCHANGE RATE

London, Feb. 11.— (By Canadian Press).—Ship brokers, the Times says, have had ample evidence of the effect of the adverse exchange in killing trade. Incidentally, it adds, the rise in the price of dollars in Europe is proving a bad thing for the new American merchant marine. European countries cannot afford now to charter American tonnage on a dollar basis. A short time ago the pound sterling in London would buy about \$4 in New York, so that the rate of freight for American tonnage of a \$40 ton from New York to Europe would represent a payment of about 200 shillings, but now, with the pound sterling only buying \$3.40 the cost in sterling for the same rate of freight of \$40 has made the cost of American tonnage practically prohibitive. The cost of remitting freight at \$40 would now be 235 shillings, a rise of 35 shillings a ton, although the rate of freight has pat the present the present the rate of freight has pat the present the prese lings, a rise of 35 shillings a ton, al-though the rate of freight has not in-creased. 
