HOME WORK WILL BE DISPENSED WITH

"Cramming at Home" Unnecessary, Declares Windsor Inspector.

WINDSOR, Nov. 18.—"Cramming at home," or home work as it is known to children of school ages, will be abolished in the Windsor Inspectorate of public schools. It was announced tonight by Inspector J. E. Benson at a convention of provincial home and school clubs.

Declaring that home work is not now necessary, Inspector Benson asserted that rules making such work compulsory in schools within his inspectorate would be rescinded before the January term begins.

Mrs. A. Curtis, Toronto, again urged mothers to get first-hand information about conditions in schools attended by their children.

FIND PLENTY OF DEER UP NORTH

ST. THOMAS, Nov. 18.—Two large parties of deer hunters, captained by Herbert Henderson of Pingal and A. E. Ponsford of this city, returned home from Northern Ontario Friday afternoon. Each of the 20 men of the two parties brought with them a full quota of deer.

The members of the party reported the best year on record for hunters in the North.

The men claimed that the deer have never been more plentiful in the North nor the hunting season more favorable. Cold weather prevailed the entire time, with considerable snow, making conditions excellent for tracking. Game and hunting paraphernalia was brought to St. Thomas in a special C. P. R. car, while the hunters also had a special sleeper and day coach for their accommodation.

CLIMBS STEADILY TOWARDS OBJECTIVE

Children's Hospital Committee Reports Good Progress.

The sum of \$131,000 of \$150,000 guaranteed has already been paid over to the building committee of the Children's Hospital, according to report made by the honorary treasurer, Mrs. C. T. Campbell, at a meeting of the War Memorial Children's Hospital committee, held at the Y. W. C. A., King street, Friday afternoon.

Especially encouraging were the communications read by the honorary secretary, Mrs. F. J. Greenaway, these accompanied in many cases by checks as a practical expression of sympathy with the work.

Immediately following his visit to the city a couple of weeks ago to unveil the corner-stone, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor sent a check for \$100 on behalf of himself and Mrs. Cock-shutt. An act considered most gracious was that of the Galt Women's Hospital Auxiliary, in sending a donation of \$25 after the convention recently held here of the United Hospital Aids of Western Ontario. In addition, a donation was also sent from the "Twig Society," a branch of the Galt Hospital Aid. Other donations mentioned were one of \$27 from Dawn Chapter, I. O. D. E., \$50 from Ferguson Crossing Needle Club; \$25 from the Women's Music Club; \$300 from Dundas Centre Epworth League; \$22, Alvington Ladies' Book Club; \$500 for a crib from the Blair Women's Institute; \$25 from the Catholic Club of the Musical School of the Sacred Heart Convent.

Regretful reference was made to the death of Mrs. Charles H. Ivey, who had closely associated herself with the work of the committee, through subscribing \$500 to endow a crib in memory of her daughter, Miss Helen Ivey, who died while on overseas service. A resolution of sympathy will be forwarded from the committee to Mr. Ivey.

The Overseas Chapter, I. O. D. E., it was stated, has chosen the room it wishes to furnish, the northeast room in the centre corridor.

A letter from Hon. Peter Smith announced that he had passed along to Hon. Mr. Nixon, provincial treasurer, a letter from the committee with regard to the provincial grant of \$20,000, due in November.

A thousand dollars has been paid over of the amount realized from the disposal of the Ford Sedan car above the sums for which return was asked. Previous to the meeting of the hospital committee, the canvass committee, of which Mrs. John Gemmell is convener, held a most encouraging session. Reports of conveners working on the last \$100,000 required to complete the hospital, stated that they had met a sympathetic response from the people they had called upon. At present they are calling on the professional people, and will make an effort to call on everybody before January. Any citizens overlooked by that time will be reached in a grand wind-up whirlwind campaign.

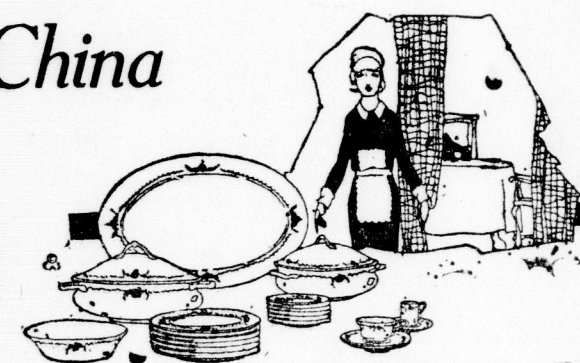

CHARGES MEIGHEN BLOCKED EFFORTS

Murdock Tells Reason for Resigning From Board of Commerce.

CLINTON, Nov. 18.—Speaking in the interests of Thomas McMillan, Liberal candidate in the riding of South Huron, in the town hall tonight, James Murdock of Toronto, a former member of the board of commerce, declared that Hon. Arthur Meighen had attempted to create an impression in the House that he had not blocked the efforts of the board. Mr. Murdock said that although he had been approached to enter the federal contest as a Liberal candidate, he declined because he did not believe in class legislation. He predicted that on Dec. 6, the Meighen government would be thrown out "bag and baggage" and that two-thirds of the people of Canada would vote against Meighen and his colleague. Mr. Murdock said he resigned from the board because he could not accept pay for doing nothing.

He denied that the Liberal policy was a free trade policy.

Mr. McMillan stated that the Liberal and U. P. O. policies were the same and deplored the fact that the two parties were not united in the opposition. He said the farmers were in the field for economic and social reasons. The candidate declared that the Meighen administration was defending the "big interests."

Dr. J. W. Shaw of Clinton presided. The meeting was largely attended.
