

Arthur Meighen had attempted to create an impression in the House that he had not blocked the efforts of the board. Mr. Murdock said that al-though he had been approached to enter the federal contest as a Labor candi-date, he declined because he did not believe in class legislation. He prebelieve in class legislation. He prodicted that on Dec. 6, the Meighen go dicted that on Dec. 6, the Meighen government would be thrown out "bag and baggage" and that two-thirds of the people of Canada would vote against Meighen and his colleague. Mr. Murdock said he resigned from the board because he could not accept pay for doing nothing.




