To Enforce Act.

"The enforcement of the Act has been placed in the hands of Mr. J. J. Kelso, provincial superintendent of neglected and dependent children, who has appointed the inspectors of Children's Aid Societies throughout the province as local officers. We have at the present time eleven cases under advisement. Several cases have been settled out of court, for which proceeding the Act makes provision.


