

AVIATORS TRYING FOR NEW RECORDS

French Fliers Have Been Aloft For Over Twenty-Four Hours.

Associated Press Despatch. Etampes, France, Aug. 7.—The French aviators, Drouhin and Landry, have been aloft for 24 hours in an attempt to break the world's flight records for duration and distance flown. They took off at 5:30 o'clock yesterday morning over a hundred-kilometre (62 mile) course from Chartres to Etampes, and by 6 o'clock this morning they had covered nearly 3,000 kilometres (1,242 miles).

They are flying a Farman Goliath, 500-horsepower, 12-cylinder motor plane. When they started they had 1,050 gallons of gasoline and 50 gallons of oil. It was believed this was sufficient to keep them in the air for 80 hours.

So far as distance goes, they will have to beat the record of 4,455 miles made by Lieutenants Kelly and McCready in a United States army plane at Dayton, Ohio, in 1923. They will have to beat Drouhin's record of 37 hours, 56 minutes and 19 seconds, made last year.

HOTEL DETAILS ARE EXPLAINED

and J. J. Lussier and son Russell, prospective operators of the hotel when completed. Mr. Lynch gave the details given by Mr. Moore, Mr. Ivey and Mr. Lussier.

With all the cards on the table and all questions satisfactorily answered, the joint committee of the city and county in favor of a motion by Ald. Douglas to appoint a committee to act in conjunction with the local hotel committee, so that speedy action in the matter might be taken.

The proposal. Stated briefly, Mr. Trainers' proposition was this: His company, the Lynch Construction Company of New York, which recently completed the erection of the Book-Cadillac hotel in Detroit, will undertake the construction of an hotel in London, preferably on the Federal Square site at a cost yet to be determined definitely, but which will run approximately a million dollars. His company will undertake to finance 75 per cent of the cost of construction, local capital to the extent of 25 per cent being required. As part of the latter amount, the company is willing to accept the site already held by the previous hotel company, and in exchange it will give the Federal Square site, the exchange to be made on an equitable basis values of both sites to be fixed by appraisal. If the Federal Square site is found to be the more valuable, the company will pay the city the difference.

Supply furnishings. Furnishings, estimated at cost between \$175,000 and \$250,000, will be supplied by the operator of the hotel, whose investment will be secured by common stock in the enterprise. Local investors will be given preferred stock for their investment. Bonds for the balance of the amount will be secured by first and second mortgages. The company will, in every instance possible, sub-contract the work of construction to local firms, and material will also be purchased locally.

In giving his reasons for preferring the Dundas street site to the Richmond street site, Mr. Lynch pointed out that the Dundas street site is cut off from the business area by the Carling block, a whole city block of government offices, which are a dead spot in the thoroughfare. The trend of business, he believes, will continue eastward along the Dundas street front, and the hotel, if more easily financed, as well as adding materially to the city's retail district.

A city building opposite the customs house and postoffice will tend to carry out the Federal square idea, and should prove, in his estimation, an ideal site. Similar views were expressed by Mr. Lussier, who assured the aldermen that he was prepared to operate a first-class hotel such as the city would be proud of.

"No city is better than this hotel," he told them. "I know what you want, and I will endeavor to give it to you."

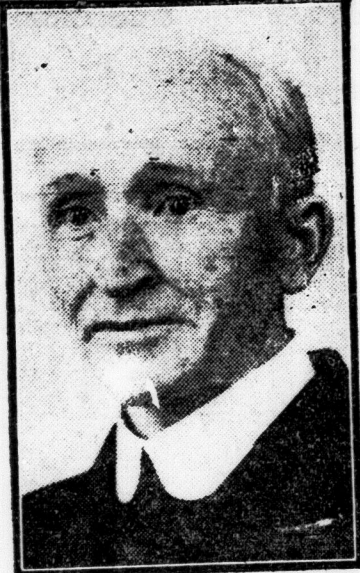

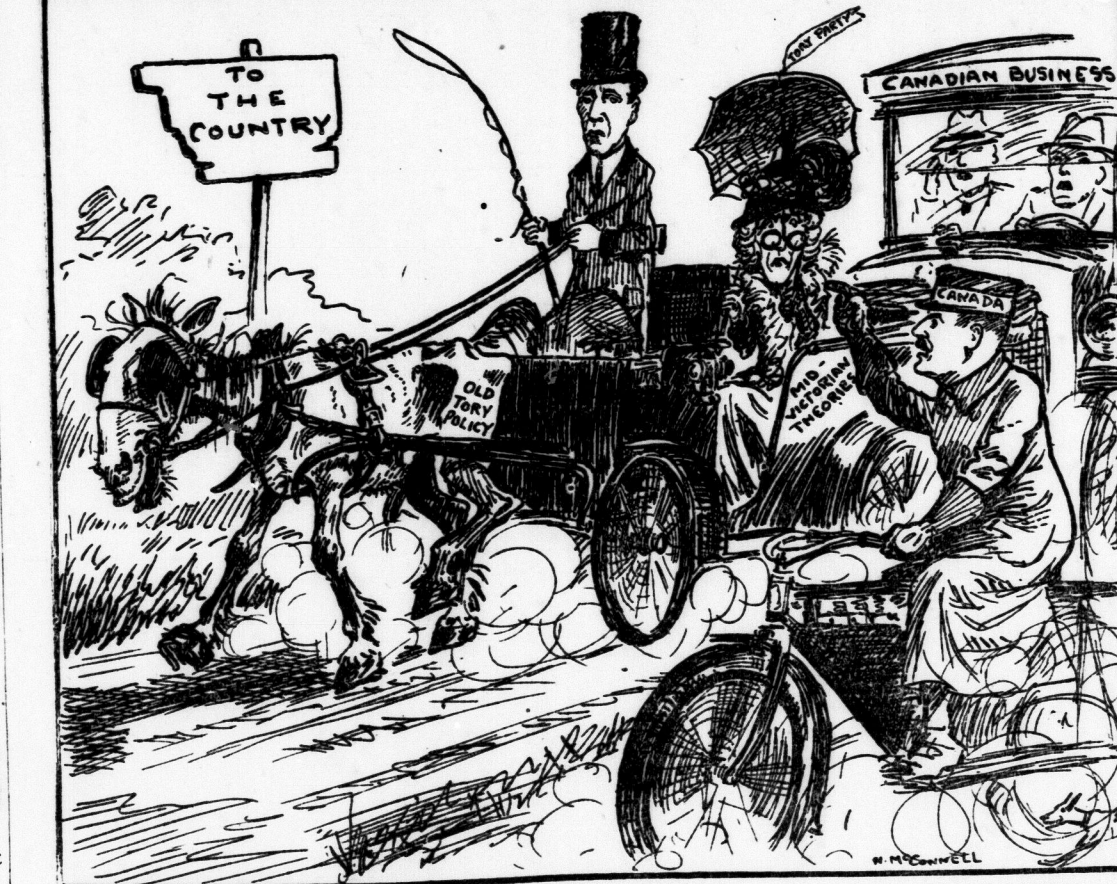
