MacBride Corruption Case Slated For Spring Court

Magistrate Refuses To Commit Brantford Mayor For Trial.

BRIBERY IS CHARGED

Canadian Press Despatch. Brantford, Nov. 12.—On continuance of the hearing of the charge laid by W. G. Brown against M. M. MacBride, M.L.A., mayor of Brantford, this afternoon before Magistrate Campbell, of St. Catharines, of corruption over a bus franchise, the counsel addressed the magistrate. No evidence was offered for the defence. The prosecution asked for committal for trial.

Magistrate Campbell held that there was not sufficient evidence to commit Mr. MacBride for trial. He held there was no proof submitted that MacBride was then a member of the Ontario legislature, or that license fee was required.

The prosecution then asked that W. G. Brown be bound over to prosecute M. M. MacBride at the next competent court of jurisdiction, which will be the spring assizes in January. This was granted by the magistrate.

The charge was amended after the case opened, the words "for himself" being added after the word "corruption" in the original charge.

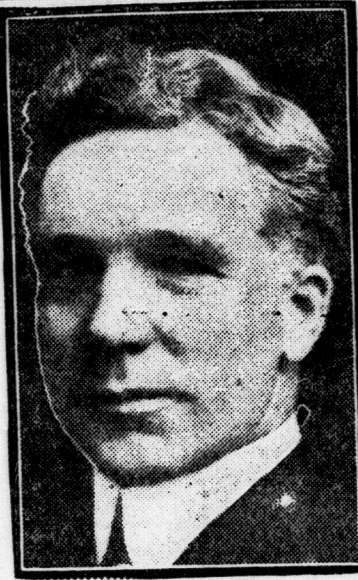
Brown, in evidence, declared that on Oct. 31, 1923, he had seen MacBride four times, in company with J. F. McCann. Conversation developed over a bus franchise from Brantford to Paris, and MacBride told him it would cost \$100.

The three got into McCann's car and went to 341 St. Paul's avenue, where complainant then lived. In the presence of the complainant's wife and mother, MacBride repeated that it would cost \$100. Witness promised \$50 then and \$50 later.

MacBride said: "Don't take the money to my house; I won't be home. Take it to McCann's." A check for \$50 was taken to McCann that evening. The check was produced in court. MacBride had said that he was going to Toronto the next day. He did not get the franchise, although MacBride said it would be all right, and he tried to get his money back, going to Brewster & Hyde, barristers.

DRIVES CAR WHILE DRUNK, TORONTO MAN ARRESTED

St. Catharines, Ont., Nov. 12.—John Fountain, 3 Edgemoor road, Toronto, drove down St. Paul street through barriers and over freshly-laid concrete on his way to the border last night. The local police car took after him, catching him near St. David's, after Fountain had collided with a car driven by George Vine of St. Catharines, both going into the ditch. Fountain was admitted to \$200 bail today to appear on Nov. 20, charged with driving while intoxicated.

NO NEW DEVELOPMENTS AT MEETING OF CABINET

Three Defeated Ministers Attend Conference With Premier.

Canadian Press Despatch. Ottawa, Nov. 12.—At the conclusion of the only cabinet meeting held this week, Premier King said to a group of newspapermen that he had no developments to announce. The meeting was attended by nearly all the cabinet ministers, including those whose resignations will be made shortly.

The defeated ministers holding portfolios—Hon. George Gordon, Hon. James Murdock and Hon. T. A. Low, will continue to administer the business of their departments for several days before leaving their offices to the other members of the cabinet, who will carry on as acting ministers. General interest centers about the probable length of the session. The prevailing opinion is that parliament will sit for a week or ten days after the opening, about December 16, and then adjourn for three weeks or a month over the Christmas and New Year holidays. It is presumed that the first week of the session will bring some alignment of the parties which will indicate the tenor of the fifteenth parliament.

WORKER USES HAMMER TO DETAIN MOTORIST

Demands Driver To Rush Injured Man To Hospital Following Accident.

Special to The Advertiser. Toronto, Nov. 12.—Two employees of the transportation commission, Charles Rose, aged 39, living at the rear of 107½ Edward street, and William Lindsay, aged 34, of 2208 Dufferin street, are in the Western Hospital suffering from serious injuries as the result of being struck and hurled to the pavement on King street by a motor car driven by Thomas Fleming at 4:30 this morning.

Rose and Lindsay were rushed to the Western Hospital, where it was found that Rose was suffering from scalp wounds, a cut over the left eye and possible internal injuries.

Following the accident, Fleming was arrested by Constable Kenny (11) on a charge of criminal negligence, and James N. Brennan of Newburg, Ont., the other occupant of the car, was also held at a material witness.

According to the police, Rose and Lindsay, with three other men, were on King street when the motor car ran through a row of red warning lanterns and hurled both the workmen to the pavement.

After the accident another workman jumped in front of the car, and with uplifted hammer demanded that the two injured men be taken to the Western Hospital. To see that they got there he got in the car and helped to drive it to its destination. Upon arrival at the hospital the police were notified, and Constable Kenny placed Fleming and Brennan under arrest.

DEREHAM TWP. PIONEER SUCCUMBS AT INGERSOLL

Ingersoll, Nov. 12.—One of the oldest and best-known residents of Dereham township, William Wilford, died at the home of Mrs. A. J. Burdell, North Norwich, He was in his 89th year, and came to Canada at the age of twelve years. He was a member of the Ingersoll Methodist church.

Survivors are three daughters, Mrs. Thomas Caddy Banner, Mrs. Facey of Belton, Mrs. A. J. Burdell of North Norwich; four sons, John Wilford of Ingersoll, Neil Wilford of Palmerston, William and James Wilford of Dereham township; two sisters, Mrs. Denzil Facey of St. Marys and Mrs. Charles Sandick of Ingersoll. Mrs. Wilford predeceased him three years.

TWELVE HUNDRED ACRE SLICE CUT OFF BAYFIELD VILLAGE

Special to The Advertiser. Goderich, Nov. 12.—The Ontario railway and municipal board today approved an application removing about 1,200 acres from the village of Bayfield and replacing the same in the township of Stanley. The lands have few buildings, and have been used only for farm purposes. The board ruled that the lands should pay school taxes into a consolidated school section composed of the village and some adjacent lands, but other taxes will be paid on a township rate.

At the hearing, Vice-Chairman A. B. Ingram and J. D. Ellis composed the board; William Brydson of Clinton appeared for the applicants, and R. C. Hay, Jun., of Goderich, appeared for the corporation of Bayfield. Although Bayfield is now reduced below the requirements for a village, its identity as a village is not destroyed.
