RECEIVES A LIST OF BANNED BOOKS

Local Council of Women Files Names Away For Public Reference.

Mrs. John Rose, president of the Local Council of Women, has just received the Dominion government list of banned periodicals and books. The list was forwarded to her from the national convener appointed to deal with such matters, and will be placed in the keeping of the Local Council of Women for public reference.

An effort is being made to have a wider distribution of this list in order that such literature can more quickly be banished from the country. Already hundreds of banned books have been confiscated by the police. And every case, with the exception of two, the possessors of these books were quite willing to part with them. In the two instances referred to, the owners were foreigners who did not understand why their possessions were being taken from them.

Accompanying the list is a letter which states that any one wishing to have a book placed upon the banned list may do so by sending the name of the book and its author to the postmaster-general.

Dorothy Dix's Letter Box

The Overworked Mother Whose Able-Bodied Sons Refuse to Help Her. How Can She Cure Her Sweetheart of the Wanderlust?—The Girl Who Cannot Forget Her Fiance's Former Love Affair.

Dear Dorothy Dix—I have two sons, the youngest 24, who never consider me or think that I ever get tired. They leave dead matches and cigar ashes all over the house. They never pick up or put away their personal things. They will watch me cut wood, and do heavy lifting without offering to help. They find fault when I say that I do not have time to answer the telephone. They get cross if I don't butter their biscuits, cakes or toast.

I try to be a good housekeeper, and am always fixing them good things to eat, but I get so discouraged that I wonder if there is any pleasure in the world for me. Do you think it would be mean if I should refuse to wait on the boys when they are able to wait on themselves? B. B.

But it makes a slave of the one woman who has to hang up and pick up and sweep up after a family who seem to believe that their belongings are automatically switched to where they belong, and that their dirt disappears as if by magic. If every member of a household would clean up after himself or herself, there wouldn't be so many monuments in the cemeteries to our beloved wives and mothers.

One's sympathy for these domestic martyrs is, however, considerably modified by the knowledge that they have brought their fate on themselves, so far as their children are concerned. Children treat their mothers invariably just as their mothers have taught them.

If a mother has demanded respect and consideration from her children, she gets respect and consideration. If she has permitted her children to speak impudently to her, they say insulting things to her; if she assumes all the burdens, they let her bear them.

Certainly any woman who has a son twenty-four years old who will sit idly by and see his mother spit wood and lift heavy loads is getting just what she has sown. She has failed signally in her duty to him, for she has not taught him to be chivalrous toward herself. More than that, she has done a great wrong to some other woman, because she has raised up a boy who will make a mean husband.

Probably it is too late to change your sons now, B. B., but wake them up as much as you can by refusing to wait on them any more. You can at least save yourself some labor. DOROTHY DIX.

Answer: The wanderlust is the most consuming of all passions, and when it is in one's blood, there is no cure for it. No matter how much a man loves a woman, no matter how brilliant the opportunities offered him, in some regular employment, he simply cannot bide at home. There comes a day when the broad highway calls louder than the voices of wife and children when the glamor of strange places is more than the prospect of riches, and he must either go or break his heart in repining.

There are birds you cannot tame, animals you cannot domesticate, men you cannot tie to a hearthstone. And you had just as well face this fact and decide your problems accordingly.

But the old proverb about the rolling stone gathering no moss is not necessarily a true one now. Business nowadays is often an adventure in itself and fortunes go to those who have the spirit of the adventurer, and willing to go into strange places and live hard and dangerous lives. There are oil wells to be drilled in wild places; rubber to be raised; copper to be gathered; minerals to be mined in regions that furnish hairbreadth adventures at every step.

Why not get your man with the wandering foot to turn his steps into some of these profitable paths? But if you are one of those women who love the quiet life and your own dollies and mahogany, think long before you marry a man who can't bear to be caged. The tiger and the lamb make ill together.
