And is Now Believed to be Far Out of Reach of the Charleston

The Esmeralda still at Acapulco Short of Coal- She May Obtain It By Force

mail and express from Acapulco, Mexico, says:—It seems now certain that the Es-meralda must have recourse to some desmust have, if she is to get back to Chili. It is announced to day that the Pacific mail SS. Co. has ordered its agent not to sell the Esmeralda any coal under any circumstances. This order was communicated to the Commander of the Esmeralda, and it is now thought extremely probable that the Chilian will take coal by force. This is thought the more probable as it is known that the Esmeralda's captain is now in command of the Itata, having boarded her when the two vessels met off the port Friday night. Should the acting captain of the Esmeralda decide to take coal by force, there is absolutely nothing to prevent him from hauling his vessel along side the coal hulk and taking what he wants, for the forts are worthless as against modern ordnance, and the Esmeralda could, if molested, lay Acapulco in ruins in half an hour. The Mexican authorities will hardly be Itkely to offer any opposition to a powerful ship like the Esmeralda, and thus bring on a bombardment of the town; nevertheless there is intense excitement.
