





New Manager For C.P.R. Hotels

Mr. Frank L. Hutchinson, after many years service has resigned his position as manager in chief of Canadian Pacific hotels to engage in other business, and Mr. Andrew Albertson is appointed general superintendent of Canadian Pacific hotels with offices at Montreal.



Mr. Hutchinson, who is understood to have purchased a large farm in Vancouver Island, where he intends to reside, was born in London, Ontario, on August 10th, 1869. He entered the service of the Bank of Montreal in 1888 and remained there until 1907 when he became a member of the Montreal Stock Exchange. In March, 1907, he joined the C. P. R. service as a clerk in the manager's office at Montreal. In 1908, he was appointed manager of the Windsor Hotel, Montreal, and in 1910, he was appointed manager of the Hotel Vancouver. In 1911, he became assistant manager in chief of hotels, Montreal, and in April, 1912, he was appointed manager of the Hotel Frontenac, Quebec, and in February, 1915, he became clerk in the Pike Hotel, Montreal, of which he became manager in April, 1916.

ALLAN A. CROCKET DEAD AT LOS ANGELES

Son of Late, Dr. William Crocket, Fredericton.

FREDERICTON, April 25.—Word was received here this morning of the death at Alameda, Cal., of Allan A. Crocket, fourth son of the late Dr. Crocket, formerly chief superintendent of education of New Brunswick, and Mrs. Crocket, of this city. His death followed an operation for an affection of the eye several weeks ago.

The late Mr. Crocket was born at Chatham, N. B., on May 2, 1864, and left here 40 years ago for Boston after having qualified as a mechanical engineer in this city. He was afterwards for some time engaged on the construction of the Panama Canal, but has spent practically all his life since leaving here at San Francisco with the exception of a few years he was in Australia, where he was married. He wrote largely for mechanical journals and at various times had addressed important gatherings in American cities on mechanical subjects.

Besides his widow he is survived by four sons, two of whom were overseas in the American Expeditionary Force during the war, and two daughters. His mother, Mrs. William Crocket, of this city; six brothers, James H. Crocket, Dr. W. C. Crocket and Mr. Justice Crocket, of this city; Charles S. O. Crocket, of Campbellton, Dr. Pierce Crocket, of St. John, who has been spending the winter at Los Angeles, Cal., and Octavius Crocket, of Moncton, and two sisters, Miss Deme Crocket, of this city, and Mrs. H. Harper Smith, of Toronto, also survive.



HOSTEL AT MONCTON

Modern Residence Completed For Girl Employes Of Atlantic Underwear Limited.



One of the most modern girls' hostels in Canada has recently been completed by Atlantic Underwear Limited, for the accommodation of their girl employes at Moncton, N. B. The hostel for employes is an innovation in the Maritime Provinces, and the Atlantic Underwear Company is to be congratulated upon its progressiveness in thus providing congenial and wholesome quarters for their girls.

The residence was planned by J. W. Fraser, A. R., L.B.A., of Moncton. It contains a library, living and rest rooms, a first aid hospital ward, well-lighted and aired bed-rooms, ample bathrooms and a well equipped laundry for the use of the girls. The hostel is in charge of a matron, and a chef supervises the kitchen. Food and lodging are provided at cost, and will not be in excess of Five Dollars a week.

Recreation facilities have not been overlooked, for the Company realizes that good food and rooms are not sufficient for the welfare of the employes. The girls will be permitted to entertain their friends, and in addition to a good dance floor and musical instruments, games, etc. are provided for this purpose. For outdoor amusement tennis courts and croquet lawns will be completed by early summer.

The Atlantic Hostel is a commendable effort to elevate the living conditions of the girl workers and to provide them with all the comforts and facilities of a home. Its influence will undoubtedly be reflected not only among the employes themselves but throughout the community.

It has always been the policy of the Company to attract the best class of help attainable to their employ, and the present large investment is a practical working out of the theory, that only when employes are well provided for physically and mentally, that the highest quality of workmanship can be obtained.

Wilson, who has returned from Ottawa, says the referendum on the question of liquor importations for personal use in New Brunswick cannot take place the last of June, as proposed by the Alliance. The earliest possible date is July, and it is suggested that the referendum do not take place until the middle of October, suggesting October 10th or 17th.
