

# AT OSOODE HALL.

At Justice Galt will Quash Some Local Judgments Yesterday.

Before the master in chambers yesterday afternoon a motion was made in the libel action of Mary Helen McKendry of Parry Sound against James M. Anley for the publication of a witness for discovery. The plaintiff, who carried on business as a general merchant at Parry Sound, alleges that the defendant wrote a letter to Teller Bros. of Collingwood, wholesale biscuit manufacturers, containing a statement regarding her financial standing which was a libel on her. She asked for an order for the examination of the Teller Bros., who deny that they received any such letter, on the ground that if no such letter exists the action will not go to trial. The motion was refused with costs.

Chief Justice Galt yesterday made an order allowing the Imperial L. & I. Co. judgment for possession of the premises of the Toronto Rowing Club. The club purchased the premises from the L. & I. Co., but failed to keep up the payment of interest, and now the company are selling the premises to realize their money.

A motion in Luck v. Leamington to quash a local option bylaw, but was enlarged till Tuesday. His Lordship stated that although he had not had time to write a judgment on the motion to quash a similar bylaw of the municipality of South Norwiche, he had made up his mind that the bylaw was bad and must be quashed.

Solutions related by members of the House of Commons who fear their seats may be contested were yesterday anxiously watching proceedings at Osgoode Hall to see the earliest possible moment at which petitions would be filed, in order that those petitions might be prepared and filed before the time has expired. It is expected that a large number of petitions will be filed today and Monday.

A writ was issued yesterday by Bain, Laidlaw & Knappe against the executors of the late John Wilson, clerk in Holy Orders and Bishop of Peterborough, asking that they account to the next of kin for some \$27,000 which, it is alleged, remains in the hands of the executors after payment of debts and legacies under the will.

The Industrial Schools. The annual meeting of the Industrial School Association of directors was held yesterday in the boardroom, No. 32 Church-street. Dr. Meredith, president, occupied the chair. Those present were: Mrs. Atkins, Mrs. Harris, Mrs. Devlin, Miss Wilkes, Messrs. E. J. Stewart, Warrington Kennedy, J. L. Hughes, W. O. Wilkinson, D. J. McKinnon, Beverly Jones and Dr. Meredith.

Mr. Kennedy opened the meeting with prayer. The report of the sub-committee on the work of the school showed 116 on the roll, of which were on trial with far-thers. The sum of \$70 was granted for meals and other amounts for supplies. A communication from the Attorney-General stated that the school could be granted for buildings, but that \$3000 an increase of \$1000 over the year would be put in the estimates for maintenance. A resolution of thanks was passed for the increase.

Messrs. Howard, Jones and Dr. Meredith were appointed a committee to draft an appeal to the public for building funds. Mr. J. R. Cartwright went to say that the proposed plan for the school was not feasible owing to the limited size of the plant.

On motion of Mr. Kennedy, Messrs. Hughes and Jones were delegated to draft a memorial resolution of sympathy and regret touching the lamented death of Mr. G. E. Gillespie, who had been an early and earnest friend of the schools. His influence had been in the council on more than one occasion for the benefit of the association. Mr. Jones also made feeling reference to the deceased gentleman.
