therefexhaustively into the question of the harmony that exists between the undulatory theory of light and the theory of sound, and gave an interesting description of the "visible sound" of the Niagara cataract, which he had been the first to observe in 1857. It was necessary to so introduce the subject under discussion, as the fact of being able to photograph the colors of the spectrum is the one absolute proof hitherto wanting of the wave heory of light. The details of the method, idiscovered by Prof. Lipmann of Paris, were illy explained and a photograph of the spectrum, with which Mr. Harvey had been especially favored, was projected on the screen. It is not claimed that photo-chromy has yet advanced to the stage where a discovery becomes of great value to science. In this, as in other fields of research, the work is slow, but the possibilities are great and physicists will carefully watch the results of Prof. Lipmann's further efforts. Mr. Harvey, in conclusion, stated that he would at an early date give a practical illustration of the process.


