

\$10,000 TO BOOM THE CITY.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS THE APPROPRIATION.

Five Cent Fare to the Island Proposed—Another Breeze Over the Appropriation of Engineer Frank-Tank Water Pipe Contract Again causes a Lively Discussion in Committee.

At the meeting of the Executive Committee yesterday the vexed question of the appointment of Robert Pink, M.E., to the position of chief engineer, a salary of \$2000, was furnished a more of contention over which the members scrapped for fully three-quarters of an hour, notwithstanding that Ald. Lamb pointed out to Mr. Keating the right to dismiss any Mr. Keating the pumping station should be set off. The council had no right to interfere in the matter whatever.

Ald. Shaw complained that it was not the council which was interesting, but the individuals. He understood that Mr. Pink had only been introduced to the council within the last few weeks. He questioned whether the City Engineer could act as a glance whether a man was a competent engineer or not. When the Parks and Gardens Committee's report came up for discussion Ald. Lewis advised that, instead of charging the ferry \$1000 for the use of the island wharf, an arrangement be made for the charging of a reduced fare of five cents.

Ald. Hewitt's committee for devising the best means of advertising the city at the World's Fair submitted its report recommending the issuing of an art newspaper and souvenir, in book form, containing illustrations of the most prominent public and other buildings in the city, street views and such other views as may be decided upon, together with a series of pamphlets showing the advantages of Toronto as a manufacturing, commercial and educational center.

Having agents at Chicago and Niagara Falls with large size duplicate photographs for distribution. And that the pamphlets and pictures should be placed in the public libraries and hotels throughout the world. The sub-committee has recommended the appropriation of \$10,000 by the Council for this purpose.

Next morning when Pugh and Gray awoke they noticed immediately that Stacey was gone. His absence did not excite apprehension until on rising they found their best clothes were gone, with all their jewelry, their patent leather shoes and Pugh's \$105. The police were notified and Gray went in search of Stacey, but he was nowhere to be seen.

The stolen property altogether is said to amount to \$300 or \$400.

The boys were on their way to Hawaii, where Pugh said he had an uncle.

Principal Dickson of Upper Canada College says the boys came to the college last October. Mr. Pugh came from the United States and was related to Mr. P. W. Ellis and Mr. Melroy of Toronto. Stacey was from Brockville and had attended the school at Port Hope, and Gray was from St. Thomas. All three were about 16 or 17 years of age and Stacey and Gray were Orthodox.
