The following orders were given:—R. Prout & Son \$240.90 for cement and plank; A. Donald \$25.00 to pay engineer's assistants on Shawana drain; C. Sheppard \$4 to pay engineer's assistants on Wadworth Branch drain; John Sitter \$129.75 for gravel; Wm. Huff \$2 for gravel; A. B. Fray \$11.25 ditching on 17 sideoad; R. Sutherland \$5.50 repairing scarpers; F. Melville \$400.00 to pay men removing jam in Canada Co. Canal and G. A. McCubbin \$1170.00 for plans report, etc., etc., on Canada Co. drain.

The reeve and Mr. Walden were appointed to let and superintend the work on the Canada Co. Drain.

Mr. Thomas was authorized to sell the two wheeled scrapers to the contractor on the provincial highway.

Council adjourned to meet on the 2nd Monday in August at 10 a.m.

The Court of Revision on the Canada Co. Drain by-law lowered John Patchings assessment \$20 and raised Fred Clark's \$20. With these changes the assessments were confirmed.
