Mr. T. W. Russoll, M.P., addressed his constituents in South Tyrone at a meeting in Clogher. His address of a meeting in Clogher. His address of a felience of land purchase for Irefand. He looked upon it that the land question would have to be opened afresh, a fact for which not tenants but land-lords were responsible. He assumed, for the purpose of discussion, that his scheme would havelve a sum of £120,000,000. During the past thirty years the Government had advanced to the English municipalities for public purposes, five times this sum and he failed to see why this same principle should not be applied to Ireland. Ho also could not understand why the Irish County Councils should not each guarantee the advance for its own county. The State would thus have the security of lands and rates and there was no reason why either should lose anything. Proceeding he outlined a system of classification on Irish lines with a view to fixing the purchase price. As purchasing terant he would derive immense benefits from the acquirement of land. He thought he was entitled to make some little sacrifice. Again, on the other irand, where the principle of compulsion was applied to a man's property the rule was to consider it when fixing the price.
