the Chicago atock yards have hardened the prines without stimulating the demand. The future of provisions is, to say the least, dubious. A quiet trade is reported in hame, pork and lard, but the business is devoid of any

interesting features.

to be unusually small, but shipments from this side are very much less in volume than they have been for several past sessons. The production, both in the United States and Canada is comparatively but little more than sufficos to supply local demands, as that it is not surprising that figures should finance and commerce. be firmly held.

VECETABLES.—Potatoes are in full supply, and of excellent quality as a There is an active movement in them at 20 to 22 cents for round mie. lots. Other vegetables are plentiful, and the demand for them is quite

active.

FRUIT.-The demand for dried fruits is quite brisk, and the country is taking considerable quantities at what are reported to be satisfactory figures to importers and dealers. The shipping of native fruits from this Province continues in large volume, and the English markets are firm with an advancing tendency.

LIVE STOCK.—The quality of both neat cattle and sheep coming to this market is better this year than usual, and prices generally are reasonable.

The supply is ample for all demands.

Sugar and Molassus.—These articles are rather weak and inactive, but

a fair amount of business has been transacted.

THA AND COFFEE,-The demand has been fair, but not specially lively and the situation and prices are unchanged.

LUMBER.-The erection of new buildings makes the demand for all

kinds of lumber good, and considerable business is done.

COAL.—Many people are now putting in their winter supply. Our mine owners are careful not to overstock the market, so that prices are firmly prepared by a reliable Wholesale maintained; but they do not advance, as has been customary at this season House, and can be depended upon as

in the past,

FIBH .- The fish market remains quito active for all description of fish except No. 3 large mackerel, which are not so much enquired for; but we think all that are held here will be wanted. We did hope, from the report of mackerel on the coast some days ago, east and west of Halifax, that the fishermen would secure quite a quantity, but we think now such is not the case. At many parts of the coast, east and west of Ealifax, fishermen have not taken a barrel; others have been more fortunate; but the whole quantity taken is quite small. All the fish arriving have found purchasers at fair prices, except No. 3, large mackerel, which are off a shade since our last issue. Small arrivals of French codfish have taken place, which have been placed at about \$2.05 per qtl. We think we are correct in stating that the quantity of French codfish arriving at this market this fall is about 30,000 qtls., which has kept out of this market the same quantity of the catch of our own fishermen; but perhaps later on, prices may have advanced, and if so, they will benefit by it. We think the quantity of hard cured Shore codfish arriving is about the same as last season; and we are informed that generally the fish are better made than usual, the weather being very suitable all the season for making fish. The catch of mackerel is now quite over for this season; and the quantity taken on this coast is, we are informed, less than for some years past. We have no way of getting at the quantity, no record being kept of the catch.

Herring .- The catch of roe Shore herring appears to be very short this

fall, and prices have advanced considerably.

The fact is, all fish but really large fat mackerel are higher in this market than any other market we know of. There is a slight advance in the Jamaica and Porto Rico markets, but the present quotations will not yet pay. If shippers will hold back from shipping, or ship small quantities, both these markets will advance.

Boston advices to 5th inst., are about as follows:-"There has been a fair trade in fish during the past week; but it mackerel there is but little doing, awing to the scercity of cheap grades. A cargo of 2,000 qtls. French codfish now offering and reported sold, at \$3.25 per qtl, and three more cargoes are reported on the way."

Advices from New York fish market to 5th inst., are about as follows: "The trade for mackerel has been fair this week for 2's and 3's, and market about bare of these, There are several lots o' No. 1 mackerel on the market, but they are down, and but few are selling. As 2's are scarce, it looks as though they would have to use No. 1 more freely soon. Last sale Shore 2's \$16.50; 3's \$11.50; small 3's \$8.50; Bay 2's \$13.00; 1's held all the way from \$16.00 to \$18.00; Shore 1's \$22.00. No P. E. Island or Nova Scotia mackerel to speak of on the market. Codfish dull, at \$3.50 for best George's.

Gloucester, Nov. 5 .- The fish business this week has been fair, although bed weather for making fish has caused some orders to lay over until the last two days. Not many macketel moving,—not any sales of packed trips. Western Bank fishermen doing well. Not much doing on George's. Prices remain about the same. Mackerel catchers fast hauling up. Five more to arrive from the North Bay, and 20 to 25 on our own Shore. Stock of green arrive from the North Bay, and 20 to 25 on our own Shore. Stock of green George's on hand very much smaller than previous years. Shore boats have been doing well the past week, as freen fish has brought good prices. Nov. 6—Arrived from North Bay, ochr. Lizzie M. Cruter, with 325 bbls. mackerel. Nov. 8.—Arrived from North Bay, sohr. Fanny W. Freeman, with 40 bbls. mackerel; two trips of Shore mackerel, 158 bbls.; and 6 Western Bankers with 200,000 pounds codfish.
