The Diplomatic Corps Services
Section promoted the interests of
Canadian representatives abroad by
applying a policy of reciprocity to foreign representatives in Canada with
respect to diplomatic and consular
privileges and immunities.

New computer-generated identity cards and acceptances for members of the diplomatic and consular corps have been developed in cooperation with the Canada Employment and Immigration
Commission and the Canadian Banknote Company Ltd. The state-of-theart machinery which reads these documents will permit quick identification
of foreign representatives at border
points and will improve national security. Canada is one of the first countries in the world to develop such a
sophisticated identification system for
diplomatic and consular representatives.

J. FEDERAL-PROVINCIAL COORDINATION

External Affairs and International Trade Canada has a major role in coordinating the policies and activities of the federal and provincial governments in the international sphere. During the year, provincial governments continued to devote resources to promoting their interests abroad, in accordance with economic objectives. The provinces received considerable support from the Department, in various forms.

The Department continued to guide the provinces on the international scene, where they are becoming increasingly active. The provinces have 64 offices abroad as well as four representations in facilities shared in Canadian missions: Seoul (Ontario and British Columbia), Boston (New Brunswick) and Minneapolis (Saskatchewan). Such cooperation enhances the effectiveness of federalprovincial relations and will no doubt increase in future.

The Department has also reviewed the mandate of the Education Counsellor position made available by the Quebec government to the Canadian Embassy in the Ivory Coast since 1970. This mandate has been enriched and expanded while it remains fully integrated with the programs of the mission under the Ambassador's jurisdiction.

Under a 1978 agreement between Canada and Quebec concerning immigration cooperation, the parties have agreed to share the financial burden where Canadian mission premises are occupied by Quebec immigration officials.
