CAMP VERNON—ACCIDENTAL DEATH OF TWO CHILDREN FROM EXPLOSIVE DEVICE—ACTION TO PREVENT SIMILAR DISASTER

Mr. Douglas Stewart (Okanagan-Kootenay): Mr. Speaker, I wish to direct a question to the Minister of National Defence. Is the minister aware of the tragic incident yesterday which caused the deaths of two Vernon, British Columbia, children, killed when a mortar shell, picked up on a former munitions training range at Camp Vernon, exploded?

Hon. James Richardson (Minister of National Defence): Yes, Mr. Speaker, I am aware of this tragic accident. It is being investigated. I do not believe it is yet known what the explosive device was that caused the accident, but the RCMP are investigating and we are co-operating fully.

Mr. Stewart (Okanagan-Kootenay): Will the minister indicate whether or not he is prepared to issue a directive that this second world war training range be combed and recombed in order to prevent similar disasters?

Mr. Richardson: Mr. Speaker, this area has been examined by military engineers over the years, dating back as far as 1963. If there is new evidence following the investigation that warrants a further examination, then I would authorize it.
