"I have the Earl of Egremont's directions to acquaint your Lordship, that, in confequence of his Most Christian Majesty's nomination of the Duc de Ninervois to come here to treat of a peace, the King has been pleased to name the Duke of Bedford to go to Paris for the same purpose; and his Grace's appointment will be declared on Wednesday next the first of September. My Lord Egremont thinks it may be of use to make this public in the city as foon as possible.
