ENGLISH THOROGBREDS ARRIVE IN MONTREAL

Important Consignment, Including Youngster Bred by the King.

MONTREAL, Nov. 15.—An important shipment of thoroughbred horses reached Montreal yesterday by the Canadian Pacific steamship Lake Erie, inclusive of brood mares, fillies and colts. There are nine in the lot, and they were brought out from England by Mr. E. Turner-Mead of Dorchester Stud Farm, near Shrewsbury. They are now at the C.P.R. Stock Yards, Mount Royal and Berthelme avenues, and will be there for three or four days. They are to be disposed of at private sale, and are not taken up by Mr. Turner-Mead, who will take with him to his farm near Vancouver, B.C.

Perhaps the most interesting animal in the lot is one of the late King Edward's breeding. One is a brown yearling filly, bred by Orville, one of Lord Beresford's stallions. This filly goes back to Voltaire, full sister to Gold Paste, a big winner of two-year-old events this year, and a prominent candidate for the 1911 Derby and other classics.

The two yearling colts are of high-class breeding. One is a brown that was foaled on April 18. He is by Fair Start, who was by Rightaway, out of Miss Common, by Common, winner of the 2000 Guineas, the Derby and St. Leger. This colt goes back to Thorman, who in his day was a great performer. The other colt is by Primrose by Galopin. This colt is a brother to Taitell, Sturt and Glenleigh, winners this year, and was foaled on June 5.

Two of the mares in the shipment are in foal, and if they should remain in this province their offspring would be eligible for the Quebec King's Plate. They are both about twelve years of age, and are breeding purposes. Mome d'Amour is a bay mare, and is by Sorcerer, and goes back to Melbourne. She is in foal to Andover, and is due to foal in May. She is the dam of Lord of the Level and War Lord, good performers in the past season of the English courses. One of War Lord's important engagements was the Omicron Stakes, in which he ran third.
