Cleaning Stamps.

Berlin, Jan. 16.—The use of adhesive stamps under the compulsory insurance system has led to some peculiar frauds. They represented 92,000,000 marks in 1808, and most of them were in 20-pfeining category, used by servants and others whose wages range from 500 to 720 marks yearly. It has been discovered that werking girls and men out of employment often remove the cancelled stamps in their insurance books and sell them for one-third of their nominal value to men who, by chemical washing, remove all trace of the cancelling marks and then sell the stamps to thrifty insurers 40 per cent, cheaper than the Government charges. This has been done on a large scale.
