Complaints are general about the late arrival of letters and newspapers by letter mail from British Columbia cities. It is a noteworthy fact that letters and newspapers are received here some days quicker than from the Sound ports.

The majority of the population and those arriving are all Canadians, and a better service is demanded. The Seattle and other Sound papers are freighted over to here, generally 3 to 4 days ahead of British Columbia papers. All papers are still selling at 25 cents per copy.
