Washington, Oct. 4.—In the Schley naval unsel for Admiral Schley, asked Judge Advocate Lemley to summon Admirat Sampson as a witness in the case. The sampson as a witness in the case. The equest grew out of a difference in the construction of a sentence in Admiral sampson's letter to Commodore Schley, written from Key West, May 20, while Commodore Schley was with the flying quadron lying off Clenfuegos.

This is known as the "Dear Schley" letter and in it, as printed in the Navy Department documents, supplied to the Senate, the admiral said, after expressing his opinion that, notwithstanding the report that the Spanish squadron was in Santingo, it were better to continue 20 blockade Clenfuegos and Havana. "We shall continue to hold Havana and Santingo until we receive more positive in formation."
