Winnipeg, Man., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—The Canadian Northern has issued a crop report for the week ending August 6.

The weather in almost all the sections from which reports have been received has been all that could be desired, altho, in some districts, warmer weather is needed to hurry along the ripening of grain. Cutting will commence in the Brandon section in a week or ten days, and will be general in fifteen or twenty days.

The grain is ripening well this year, and nearly all the districts anticipate a heavier yield than last year.

At Oakville, the barley harvest is in full swing.

In the Dauphin section, wheat is backward, owing to too much rain and insufficient heat.
