Arrival of Princess Helene and Her Betrothed

Unique Proclamation Issued by the Municipal Authorities.

Bari, Italy, Oct. 21.—The Italian yacht Savoia, having on board the Princess Helene of Montenegro, her betrothed husband, the Crown Prince of Naples, and the members of the Leipzig, Germany, organist St. Andrew's the princely family of Montenegro, who are to be present at the marriage, arrived here this morning escorted by a squadron of Italian warships. The royal yacht experienced very bad weather while crossing the Adriatic, and nearly all the travelers were seasick throughout the passage. The prince and princess were warmly greeted on landing, a vast concourse of Anatolians and others who had arrived in the town, crowding it to its utmost capacity. The local attempts at decorating were univer-sal, but it must be added that they were ludicrous. They were made in response to the following municipal edict, which was posted on the walls of the principal thoroughfares: "Citizens of Bari: It is your duty to clean the streets of all unseemly "Used and tattered washing linen must be taken away from the win-

"Little children must no longer run naked in the streets. "Goats, cows, hens and drunken men must be kept at a proper distance. "No dust bins may, for three weeks, be emptied into the streets. "Licensed coachmen are forbidden to wear ragged liveries, and are advised to borrow disused police uniforms. "Let these things be done, and our citizens will prove themselves worthy of their ancestors, and our city wil be duly garnished for greeting the royal bride.'

The Citizen publishes a letter this morning from Wm. Buckingham, who was private secretary to Hon. Alex. Mackenzie, dealing with a very unfair attack which was made upon him in a Citizen editorial a few days ago. Disaster on the Chicago and Northwestern Railway.

Eleven Cars Tumble Into the River-Three Men Killed.

Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 21 .- A freight train north-bound crashed through the Chicago and Great Western bridge over the Platte River, 70 miles south of here. Three men were killed. The engine and part of the cars went over safely, when the bridge collapsed, and 11 cars, including the caoose, were precipitated into the river and down the embankment. The dead men were crushed in the debris. One was the conductor and two were tramps stealing a ride.
