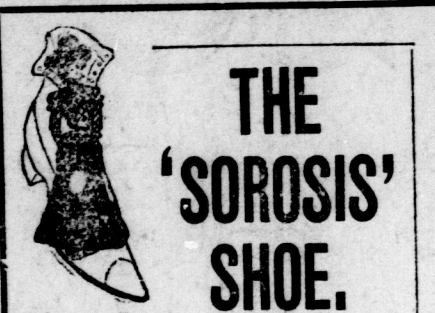

Raising the Wind

How John Bull Will Meet an Expenditure of \$564,635,000

Or an Increase of \$30,490,000 Over Last Year's Bill.

The Budget Presented in the House of Commons—New Stamp Duties and Increased Tax on Wine Proposed—Suspension of the Sinking Fund.

London, April 14.—The chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, presented the budget in the House of Commons yesterday. The house was crowded when he rose to make his speech.

He said the trying episodes of last year's Spanish-American war and the difficulties on the Niger and the Nile, had no prejudicial effect upon the country's revenue, the result for the year being a small surplus. Continuing, he confessed to being disappointed with the tobacco receipts, but said that if they were able to leave tobacco alone he felt confident the anticipations of an increase of revenue from the increased consumption would be more than realized during the coming year.

WANTS \$564,635,000.

He estimated the expenditure for the coming year at \$564,635,000—an increase of \$30,490,000 over last year, the total increase of expenditure, during the last four years being no less than \$33,230,000. If this increase was to continue, the speaker pointed out, parliament must agree to a large increase in taxation or discover new and productive sources of revenue, or the result would be a reaction against great expenditure, and he feared that such a reaction might impair the efficiency of the defensive services to the point in which they unhappily stood during the last generation.

LOOKING TO THE PEACE CONFERENCE.

The chancellor of the exchequer continued: "We must, however, be hopeful that the approaching conference of the powers, who are animated by a desire for peace, may devise a check for this terrible competition of armaments, so wasteful of our ability, energy and money, from which even the wealthiest nations may well pray to be delivered. (Cheers.) At the same time, if the expenditure on armaments is reduced, I am convinced we shall have to increase it in another direction. I fear the expenditure of the present year cannot be regarded as merely temporary. The sum of \$38,680,000, the largest on record, will be available for the reduction of the debt."

THE NEW SINKING FUND.

He added, would, in consequence of various increases, augment till it should reach \$46,070,000 in 1905. It was never intended that the fund should increase to such an extent. He proposed to prolong the savings bank terminable annuity, amounting to \$11,000,000, from March, 1902, to 1911. The market for consols to be purchased by the government, the speaker also pointed out, had been dangerous narrow.

ED OUT, had been dangerous narrow, which had the appearance of raising the price of consols, and by purchasing, the government was practically increasing the price against itself. Persistence in that policy, he added, constituted a real danger. "In the true interests of the sinking fund," the chancellor of the exchequer then remarked, "we shall not only prolong the savings bank annuity and set up other annuities besides, but we shall reduce the fixed debt charge from \$125,000,000 to \$115,000,000." (Cheers.)

SAVED FROM WAR BY THE NAVY.

This course is justified by the facts. The taxpayers of the future will benefit by our expenditures and armaments. The strength of our navy during the past year was the main factor in saving us from war. In the event of the proposal being adopted, we shall still have to meet an expenditure of \$544,635,000. On the basis of the existing taxation we expect to get \$551,435,000. Therefore, there will be no necessity for a new departure in taxation. There are grave objections to raising the tobacco duties. It would be unwise, for the sake of a small temporary advantage, to surrender the hope of what may ultimately be a golden harvest.

TWO NEW STAMP DUTIES.

We propose two new stamp duties—5 shillings per £100 sterling on foreign and colonial bonds, stocks and shares, which now are not liable to duty. The new tax will be payable on the first occasion the documents are negotiated in this country.

The second stamp duty will be an ordinary mortgage duty of 2 shillings per £100 on loan, capital and debenture stock created by corporations or companies under the statutes. The companies' capital duty will be increased to 5 shillings per £100, and the stamp duty on letters of allotment will be increased from one penny to sixpence. It is estimated that the total increase from this source will be \$2,100,000.

Hostile to Britain

Berlin Newspapers Continue Their Bitter Comment.

Sore Over the Humiliating Occurrences at Samoa.

Russian Aggression Driving the Finns Away From Their Homes.

Resignation of the Greek Ministry—Lord Balfour on the Chinese Situation.

London, April 14.—The Berlin newspapers continue their bitter comments on the attitude of Great Britain. The semi-official Post strongly urges the reichstag to place at the government's disposal £100,000 for the whole amount of the appropriations passed in annual instalments for the naval increase last year, to invest in the work of construction, arguing that "with a respectable navy Germany need not fear a repetition of the humiliating occurrences at Samoa."

It is asserted that the statement that the Marquis of Salisbury has unreservedly adhered to the principle of unanimity in the decision of the Samoan commission is in correct. The question as to the extent to which unanimity is necessary has still to be settled, and certain reservations will probably be made by Great Britain. The exact terms of the instructions to the commissioners have not yet been agreed upon.

The Standard prints the following dispatch from Berlin: The tension between Great Britain and Germany over the Samoan question has somewhat increased since yesterday, the conferences between Baron von Buelow, German minister of foreign affairs, and Sir Frank Gellard, British ambassador at Berlin, having failed to settle all the disputed points.

The Daily Chronicle remarks editorially this morning that Lord Salisbury has yielded on the question of unanimity, the Samoan commission may as well save itself the voyage.

THE TONGA ISLANDS.

In the House of Commons, Right Hon. William St. John Broderick said no guarantee of the independence of the Tonga Islands had been given in behalf of Great Britain.

RUSSIAN TYRANNY.

Hull, England, April 14.—There is a great rush of young Finlanders for America, to avoid the recent decree of Emperor Nicholas regarding Finland, which provides for an increase of the Russian military and naval forces and the extension of conscription. The steamer Arcturus landed 315 men here yesterday from Hango, 202 arrived a few days ago, and all report that many more are coming as soon as possible. All the attempts of the Finns to check the recent Russian aggression in Finland have proved futile. The edict which makes the Russian language obligatory in the University of Helsinki, is supplemented with an order introducing Russian coinage, and directing that all old Finnish coins shall be returned to the mint and removed from circulation. The Swedish professors at the university have been replaced by Russians. Russian secret service agents, who are very active throughout the country, have been

MORE MEN FOR CTIS AT MANILA

The Arrival of the Transport Sheridan.

Lieut. Meyer Supposed to Have Fallen Overboard—Nine Deaths on the Voyage.

Manila, April 14—11:30.—The United States transport Sheridan, which sailed from New York Feb. 19, having on board the Twelfth and a battalion of the Seventeenth Infantry, has arrived here after a smooth passage.

On the night of April 11, Lieut. Meyers disappeared from the ship. The weather was intensely hot, and the lieutenant was sleeping on deck and it is supposed that he fell overboard.

NINE DEATHS.

Three privates and six children of privates died from pneumonia.

The expedition under Major-General Lawton yesterday moved twelve miles further north along the lake.

TAKING TWO TOWNS.

Longos and Paete. A squadron of the Fourth Cavalry was left to garrison Santa Cruz. There was only desultory firing from the retreating enemy until the advance reached Paete the center of the insurgents' government, in the district of Laguna de Bay. Here the road is flanked by steep hills on each side, on which the insurgents had constructed great log trenches, and also across the road. The North Dakota Regiment.

RAN INTO A CROSS-FIRE.

Squads of five sharpshooters each were sent up the steep hill and through the thick brush to flank the insurgent. One squad of the North Dakota Regiment suddenly came to the insurgent trenches, halting when only fifteen yards off. Only one man in this squad got away unhurt.

The ironclad gunboats shelled the insurgent's position for an hour. The enemy was finally driven out. Our loss was five killed and two wounded, the greatest loss Lawton has yet sustained. The launches captured on Tuesday are worth \$60,000.

The expedition has not sufficient men to leave garrisons in the towns taken.

COMES PRETTY HIGH

Price for Riding on the Sidewalk Raised—Police Court Cases.

The second offender of the season was before the police magistrate this morning. He was fined \$2. It is likely \$2 will be the minimum fine this season.
