"If the American people want prohibition it should prohibit by legislation to that end, and not force the food administration to the responsibility for an orgy of drunkenness, Mr. Hoover declares. "It is mighty difficult to get drunk on a 2½ per cent beer, but it will be easy enough if we force a substitution or distilled drinks for it."

Mr. Hoover and the president have both rebuked the radical prohibition element in the House for attempting to force the president's hands on closing the breweries and dismantling the wine presses.

Some Non-Essential Luxuries Missed in New Order.

REVENUE WILL BE CUT

War Trade Board Must Consider Action Regarding the Stuff Now in Transit.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
OTTAWA. June 5.—It will be in the discretion of the war trade board to decide what quantities if any of the list of imports barred from entry into Canada through the order issued yesterday shall be admitted under license. While applications for entry go to the minister of customs it is the duty of the war trade board to review such applications, to investigate the reasons and to recommend whether or not they have basis of justification. The licensing of imports is no new thing in Canada, or in any other country for that matter, since the war commenced. The purpose, however, is to limit imports which are non-essential. In this regard an article which appears at one time to be non-essential, The new order is restrictive rather than prohibitive.

Sparing With Licenses.

In the case of many of the items debarred under the new order, it is felt that licenses will be granted but sparlingly. They include commodities which cannot be classed under any conditions as other than non-essential and luxuries. All green fruits with the exception of oranges, lemons and bananas are debarred, for instance. Such fruits are placed on the market here as rule before the Canadian fruits are ripe. In future people will have to do without "out of season" delicacies, fetching high prices in the huckster's store. The same is true of a list of vegetables which were wont to find their way very early from the south to the tables of the rich of the Dominion and which were purchased at fancy prices.

Mill Cut Revenue.

Any estimation of the exact value of the imports affected is difficult to make. It is calculated to approximate from ten to twelve million dollars and the loss of revenue will approximate about four and half millions. One of the biggest items is automobiles. Last year a total of \$7,981,177 worth of passenger automobiles alone were imported. It is this class which will be affected, though of the 12,000 odd imported many of them would be below the value of \$1,-200, specified in the order.

Some surprise is expressed that fruit and vegetables which are considered by many, a necessity during the long Canadian winter months are debarred, while expensive luxuries, such as rugs, silks, etc., are not touched.

Certain questions as to what action would be taken in connection with goods already ordered or in transit will have to be decided by the war trade board.
