This morning at 6:45 o'clock, a "lovely" (to use the V. A. D.'s adjective) baby girl, weighing 8½ or 9 pounds, was ushered into the world in the Emergency Hospital, and both mother and babe are doing nicely, thank you, the former extremely grateful for the skillful care that has been bestowed upon herself and little daughter.

Quick Response.

Dur'ng the night, Mrs. J. F. Thomson, superintendent of No. 4 Nursing Division, received a call from a doctor in the city asking if she could have une hospital opened up at once to take in the wife of a returned soldier, who was ready for the emergency, even if it was being tended at the hospital, and made as comfortable as possible.

Yesterday, the returned man, with his wife and four little children, were removing from Windsor to Toronto to make their home there. On the train, his wife was taken ill, and they decided to stop over in London.

No Chance in Hospitals.

A doctor vas called to the hotel where they registered, the idea being to secure a bed 'n one of the hospitals. Owing to the influenza epidemic, the hospitals are filled to overflowing. In any case, they have been refusing maternity cases, because of risk to mother and babe. In the dilemma, the doctor thought of No. 4 Nursing Division, and immediately called Mrs. Thomson, who was ready for the emergency, even if it was 70 clock in the morning. The father and four older children are staying in the meantime at the Grigg House.

The case of Corp. Pugh came to the attention of the Advertiser long before he went to war. When he was released from Kingston Penitentiary early in 1914, he came to this office stating that he desired to place himself on record for a new life, and he wrote several articles on prison conditions which attracted considerable attention. During his long incarceration the man evidently had spent much time in educating himself, and came out of the portals of Kingston a trained accountant, and with more than an ordinary command of English.

When war broke out he had some trouble in getting into a battalion, but after some setbacks he went overseas and served ten months in France, giving an excellent account of himself and finally being sent back for deafness.

On his return he at once commenced to seek work, and he was for a time on the city assessment department. Gave Good Service. to seek work, and he was for a time on the city assessment department. Assessment Commissioner Grant gives him an excellent reputation, stating to The Advertiser without qualification, "Pugh's all right." The returned soldier also had an experience at the post-office, and left the employ of that department because of the fact that his record was revealed to some of the authorities. He was employed on the Dominion police at Wallaceburg for a time, and carries letters of commendation from leading residents of that place.

He was anxious to secure a civil service position, and made application. He took a high standing in the examinatook a high standing in the examina-tions, and was to have secured a post-tion at \$1,000 a year, when an order came through cancelling the appoint-ment without explanation.

Deeply Grieved.

The day he received the letter Corp. Pugh came to The Advertiser office and revealed the fact that he had been turned down. He was greatly stirred emotionally, and told a most dramatic story to the editor of this paper.

One of the men whom he met in the old days, he stated, came to him and attempted to get him to return to the gentle art of cracking safes and getting money easily. The character was one of the best-known "petermen" (nitro-glycerine safe blowers), in the country, and he offered to pay the fare of Pugh to a certain place to look over a job in which the stake was \$65,000. He told Pugh that the latter was a fool to think that the world would ever give him a chance again, and dangled the lure of "easy money" before the eyes of the man who, according to every indication, was attempting to get back on his feet and to support his family by honest work.

Pugh told The Advertiser of his refusal to accept the offer and of the crook's departure after another declaration that the London man was a fool, and should take up the chance.

"I have tried to keen straight, but these Government officials don't want me to," said Pugh at the time. He also believed that someone aware of his record was busy seeking to prevent him from securing work.

"A man might as well go and put his head under an engine and end it all," he stated. "They put you if jail if you go wrong, and they close their doors upon you if you try to go right. Your life was good enough when they needed human bodies in the front lines. Why didn't they shut me out of the army if they don't want men who have served time? I suppose they regard anyone as worthless but themselves."

The case was taken up by Secretary Cunliffe of the Great War Veterans' Association, through the Dominion executive at Ottawa, and the reply which comes back makes it plain that the Dominion Jovernment has made it a rule that no matter what service a man may have performed in France at \$1.10 a day he cannot work for the Government at home if he has a record of crime. The decision is regarded as a cruel and unfeeling attitude, and it is probable that the returned soldier's case will be made a capital issue before long.

#### **BOARD OF CONTROL** RECOMMENDS THAT PREMIUMS BE PAID

Thinks It Unfair to Soldiers to Stop Now.

Full premiums will be paid on the soldiers' insurance by the city for another year. At least this action will be recommended to the city council as a result of the meeting of the board of control this morning. The question of dropping the war premiums and letting the policies go into extended insurance on the payment of the regular premium, which is permissible under the terms of the policies, had been discussed, and it had been decided to take this step. By doing this the city would save \$5,550 this year, but unless the war premiums are paid the men would not be able to take advantage of the offer of the city to carry their policies on after their return. The policies under the extended insurance plan would lapse in three or four years. An effort was made to get in touch with the men insured to lay the plan before them and letters were sent out to all, but few replied. In view of all the facts it was thought that it would be unfair to the men to do anything while they are overseas that would deprive them of the privilege of continuing their policies after their return. the war premiums and letting the pol-
