"Knotty" Lee Visits Guelph Regarding Baseball League

GUELPH, Jan. 22.—"Knotty" Lee of Toronto, who was one of the promoters of the Canadian League, was a visitor in the city today, the fine spring weather of the past few days having had the effect of starting the baseball fever once more. "Knotty" is out to reorganize the Canadian League, on a stronger and better basis than before, and the prospects for success are exceedingly bright. He saw a number of Guelph gentlemen today regarding the placing of a team in this city, and met with much encouragement. It is a certainty that if the league resumes, Guelph will be one of the cities.

"Knotty" was, as usual, full of enthusiasm as regards the prospects for the resumption of the old Canadian League, which went out of business at the close of the season in 1915 on account of the war. He says he can see no reason why the Canadian League should not be doing business again, claiming that the public is hungry for good baseball and that a team in Guelph will again be liberally supported.

"Knotty" has already visited London and Brantford, and finds that no difficulty will be met with either of these places. In fact, he says Tom Nelson of Brantford has already got his lines out for a manager, while in London abundant backing can be secured. He figures that with the war over, and the cities of Western Ontario again resuming their industrial activities, baseball, such as was played by the old Canadian League, will receive the liberal support of the fans, and he is very anxious that Guelph should form one of the cities in the circuit. He is planning this year for eight club leagues, with Hamilton, Brantford, London, Guelph, St. Thomas, Kitchener, St. Catharines, Chatham, or perhaps Niagara Falls. N. Y. Mr. Lee has already visited a number of the leading fans of the city who are liable to give the team their support, and has received all sorts of encouragement, and there is not much doubt but that Guelph will be represented in the Canadian League in 1919. A meeting will be held in the near future in a city which will be central for all representatives. This meeting will likely be held during the first and second week in February, when the plans will be further considered.

With the eight cities above mentioned, there is population enough for a Class C league, and the same brand of ball will be played as in the Class B league in previous years. Mr. Lee will go to Kitchener tomorrow morning, and is confident that no difficulty will be experienced there in getting sufficient backing for a team.

NO GRATUITY WILL BE PAID DEPENDENTS OF FALLEN SOLDIERS

Official Denial Is Given To Statement That Has Had Some Publicity.

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—There is absolutely no truth in the statement appearing in certain newspapers that the war service gratuity, payable to men of the C. E. F. on retirement or discharge, will also be paid to war widows, dependents and next of kin of soldiers killed in action or who died of wounds. An official denial of this statement was issued today by the militia department and at the same time it was pointed out that the order-in-council makes no provision of this nature. The next of kin of deceased soldiers are provided for under the pension regulations.

The order-in-council does, however, make provision for payment of the gratuity to the dependents of a soldier who dies subsequently to his discharge or retirement and before he or his dependents have received any part or the whole of the gratuity. It states that if there survive him dependents who would have been entitled to a portion of the gratuity equal to separation allowance, at the time of his death shall be payable to such dependents.

In the case of a soldier who has no dependents entitled to separation allowance and who dies subsequently to discharge before receiving any part or all of the gratuity the portion of the gratuity unpaid at the time of his death shall not become payable.
