FLATTERING OFFERS MADE FOR DEMPSEY-CARPENTIER MATCH

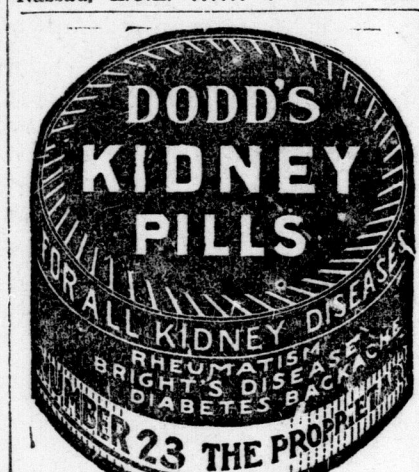
\$175,000 To Fight in England, \$150,000 For Match in New Orleans.

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—Two flattering offers for a match between Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, and Georges Carpentier, premier boxer in Europe, have been received by Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager. Kearns sent the following telegram to the Associated Press today:

Just received cable from Edward Cochran, the English promoter, offering one hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars to meet Carpentier there. Also have offer from Tortorich, the New Orleans promoter, of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for Dempsey's end to box Carpentier. Dempsey is making motion picture here, but is doing light training every day and will be willing and ready to defend his title as quick as Carpentier or any other suitable opponent. Public demands to meet Dempsey can be arranged. Would much prefer fighting in America than going to Europe, but will accept the best offer. With best wishes.

**INTERMEDIATES MAY MEET SENIORS FOR O.H.A. CHAMPIONSHIP**

R. M. Glover of Peterboro Is New President of O. H. A. —Two Referees On Large Ice Sheets.

TORONTO, Dec. 6.—There was a large attendance at the 30th annual meeting of the Ontario Hockey Association, which was held in the Temple Building on Saturday morning.

The constitution and the whole business of the convention was carried out in the proper spirit. The president's greeting, the treasurer's address and the report of the executive committee showed that the organization is in a flourishing condition. With the war a thing of the past the activities are expected to be larger than ever.

Perhaps the most important change made by the delegates was one to allow the intermediate champions to play-off with the senior winners, and then the victor of this contest goes to the Allan Cup final. The official representative of the O. H. A. in the past the intermediates were the only section that did not enter the play-off for the championship of Canada. The senior players played the other provincial champions for the O. H. A. memorial cup.

The amendments were carefully considered by the delegates. Sheriff Paxton proposed that the following be added to clause 1 of the constitution, and it passed easily:

"In cities and towns desirous of playing in the senior series no club is to be admitted to membership unless it has a bona fide permanent and general established team or club or association, and that in all towns and villages represented in the O. H. A. in any series precedence be given to civic amateur organizations representing the whole community."

D. H. Cole of Burlington wanted the seniors stopped from playing in the intermediate series, and after a long discussion a compromise was made when Kitchener proposed that each senior club be compelled to register at least six bona fide players, who will be barred from playing intermediate. This will still allow the intermediates to step up if they show the ability and stop the practice of trotting out a senior team in some intermediate fixture.

A. W. Dick's amendment to let the intermediates into the play-off, was carried by a handsome majority. Angus Campbell of the Northern Ontario Association, was a strong supporter of this amendment.

The war-time regulations in regard to soldiers were struck out after a short discussion, and in future a junior player will have the privilege of playing in the nearest town with a junior club if his home club fails to enter a team.

Hockey expenses have mounted with the cost of living and it didn't take the delegates long to advance the expenses allowed to traveling clubs. On a motion by W. A. Fry, Dunnville, fifteen cents a mile for men was set at the mark.

The referee's charge was boosted to allow him to ask fifteen cents a mile instead of ten.

The delegates passed an amendment to give the secretary authority to appoint two referees on large ice spaces when he thinks it is necessary.

Only one amendment to the playing rules was passed and it has to go before the Canadian Hockey Association as a recommendation. It is to allow a soldier to be substituted at any time. H. Sturm of Kitchener wanted the goalies to be allowed to stop the puck in any fashion, such as kneeling, lying on the ice, etc., as is in vogue in the pro league. He failed to get a second.

The usual honorariums were passed for the secretary and the treasurer, and Sheriff Paxton's motion that the O. H. A. adopt the suggestion of the A. A. U. of C. for the registration of all athletes with the provincial branch for the purposes of registration.

The St. Patrick's Club of Toronto tendered fees for the coming season, but the secretary refused to accept them. The club manager contended that this was not in order, but the president ruled that the executive had the right to refuse any entries.

Entries will close on Wednesday, and the clubs will be grouped by the executive on Friday.

BORDER RESIDENTS VOTE STRONG FOR RADIAL PURCHASE

Big Majorities Favor Hydro Commission Buying S. W. and A. Railway.

WINDSOR, Dec. 7.—By majorities in some instances as large as 20 to 1, ratepayers of nine frontier municipalities extending to Tecumseh on the east and Amherstburg on the west at the polls Saturday registered their support of the radial railway system insofar as it applies to the taking-over of the Sandwich, Windsor and Amherstburg Railway and its twenty-three miles of road by the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission.

The lack of street car service, due to the cyclone of a week ago together with a heavy fall of wet snow, made the polling of a large vote out of the question.

In Windsor the vote stood 1,100 for and 29 against; Walkerville voted 198 for and 7 against; Amherstburg 216 for and 45 against. In Ford 151 ballots were cast, all but one in favor; Ojibway stood 8 for and none against.

Unofficial records for Sandwich West and Sandwich East townships gave decisive majorities for the plan, but final figures did not come in, owing to telephone troubles.

Mayor Winter called up Sir Adam Beck late in the evening, when the outcome was certain and received the power minister's congratulations on the victory for hydro.

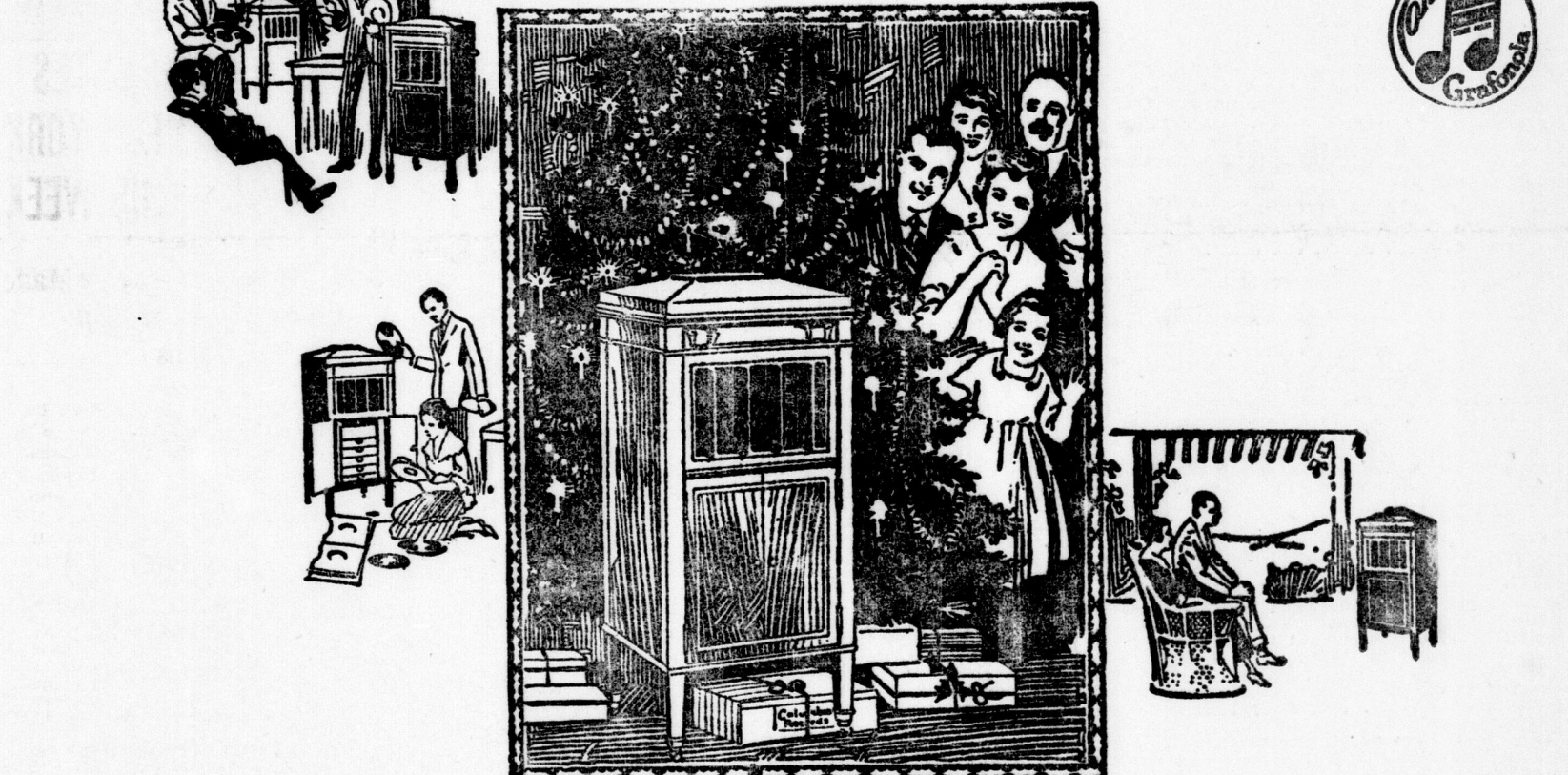
