



TORONTO, Dec. 6.-There was large attendance at the 30th annual meeting of the Ontario Hockey Association held in the Temple Building on Saturday morning.

Several important changes were made in the constitution and the whole telegram to the Associated Press today:

Sturm of Kitchener wanted the goaler to be allowed to stop the puck in any fashion, such as kneeling, lying on the ice, etc., as is in vogue in the pro league. He failed to get a seconder.
