ASK ONTARIO GOVT. TO DEFER PROPOSED TAX ON RACE TRACKS

Deputation Requests Delay Until Federal Tax Known.

TORONTO, April 21 .-- Hon. Peter Smith, Ontario provincial treasurer, was urged this morning by an influential and representative body of racetrack men to defer the imposition of any provincial tax on racetracks until the Federal Government's decision with regard to the tax on pari-mutuel machines would be determined. The provincial treasurer, together with Hon. Manning Doherty, minister of agriculture, and the Hon. W. E. Raney, attorney-general, heard the deputation. The basis of appeal as outlined by the race men is that the federal au-thorities will impose some tax upon the profits, which may be derived from the gambling devices installed at the tracks. To just what extent these profits will be limited is as yet unknown, but the claim is made that were the \$10,000 daily impost levied on all mile tracks, together with a still further federal levy, racing operations, regardless of the betting would be virtually killed. virtually killed.




COL. BIGGAR TO ACT AS COUNSEL FOR GOVT.

DELAY SETTLEMENT

OF STUTZ DISPUTE NEW YORK, April 21.-Efforts to

effect a settlement of the controversy resulting from the recent alleged corner in Stutz Motor stock have been delayed, it was learned tonight, pending the appointment of a mediation committee of three bankers to fix the prices at which the shorts should settle their obligations. Allan A. Ryan, chairman of the board of the Stutz company, who owns a controlling interest, has consented to meet the committee, but he is quoted as saying he would not grant it arbitrary power to fix settlement terms. Representatives of 56 firms who were short Stutz stock have adopted resolutions pledging themselves to abide by the findings of the committee.





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
