

FIRE GUTS QUEBEC RETAIL STORES WITH HALF MILLION LOSS

QUEBEC. Nov. 21 .- (By Canadian Press).-Fire losses aggregating over half a million dollars were caused here this morning by a blaze which swept the heart of the retail business section Richly Carved Specimens Are and at one time threatened to become on conflagration. The blaze, which was Dec. 11, Jan. 15, Feb. 19 .....Colum discovered in the early hours of the norning, had been burning for hours before discovery, and started in the drygoods firm of Marceau & Co., 155 St. Joseph street, spreading thence to the Woolworth store. The fire, reaching a deposit of celluloid goods, was followed by a violent explosion, which immediately caused the fire to spread to the Paquet clothing establishment

By 8 o'clock the blaze was under control, but not before the Marceau and Woolworth stores were completely destroyed and the Paquet Building, with its contents much injured.

Insurance is carried on only a portion of the burned stock.

Fireman Fraser Lapointe was severely burned about the head and face and was taken to Hotel Dieu Hospital. Seven other firemen were more or less injured, but remained on duty.
