MAY SEEK POWER LATER TO TAKE OVER RAILWAY

Expropriation Plan Temporarily
Laid Over—Legislation to
Be Applied For.

The civic legislation and reception committee yesterday recommended a number of items in the city's bill to be presented to the private bills committee of the legislature at the coming session, but several of the more important matters were deferred.

One of these latter was Ald. May's motion to seek power to expropriate the street railway.

"It is inadvisable at present, altho Manager Fleming seems to be doing all he can to make the ratepayers disgusted," said Ald. McMurrich. It is better, however, to put up with the inconvenience than to expropriate, which is just what the company wants the city to do. It would have to be expropriated as a going concern, while in twelve years it can be taken over as scrap iron.

Control of the street railway, as the board of control had a series of resolutions regarding the street railway to take up.

Ald. May explained that his proposal was inspired by the general dissatisfaction regarding the service, and the motion was referred to the board of control.

Legislation setting a milk standard and providing fines for dealers who sell milk of inferior quality was approved. The legislation to be applied for will enable the medical health officer to prosecute producers who are at fault, no matter how far removed from the city they may be.

It was agreed to ask for power to have all money bylaws submitted in future printed on one ballot to reduce the inconvenience caused by many ballots being offered to voters. In the recent elections there were no less than nine separate ballots.

Ald. Hilton's idea of reducing the qualifications for freehold voters so as to require them to possess property assessed not at \$400, but \$200 was approved. The city clerk suggested, also, that the provision that persons whose assessment on property or income is less than \$400, and who belong to the class of voters who can only vote for the board of education should be abolished. He stated that of the 15,000 persons belonging to this class, only 360, or 2 per cent, took advantage of their privilege. The proposal will be considered.

As there are several motions dealing with the redistribution of the wards, one of them calling for a special committee to take the matter up, this question was left over.

Ald. Phelan put up an unsuccessful fight in favor of allowing the special commission to continue to run the affairs of Balm Beach Park. Controller Ward's motion to seek legislation to transfer control to the parks commission was carried.

Getting After the Clubs.
Chief of Police Grasett in a letter suggested that the police department be given power to supervise chartered clubs, containing billiard parlors or bowling alleys, as the department has at present only jurisdiction over the licensed places. Ald. McCarthy supported this, declaring that persons to whom a license was refused had in the past gone to the Ontario Government and secured a charter. A communication will be sent to the government asking that such persons be refused charters in future and also that the hours of clubs be regulated as are those of licensed places. The proposal to limit the age of youths frequenting billiard parlors and bowling alleys to eighteen was struck out, because of the feeling that such institutions properly run, provided wholesome pastime.

An amendment to the Hydro-electric Act will be sought empowering the city to make contracts for power with the government for ten years or more. At present the contracts are renewable from year to year.

The government will be asked to limit the renewal of the Consumers' Gas Co. to \$700,000.

Ald. Maguire's proposal to seek the co-operation of the local members of the legislature in getting the city's bill thru was adopted.

The usual appropriation of \$5000 for reception purposes will be asked. Last year the actual expenditure was \$4500.

Board of Health.
Ald. McMurrich was re-elected chairman at a brief sitting of the local board of health yesterday.

Medical Health Officer Sheard was requested to draw up specifications for the new wing of the isolation hospital, plans for which have already been approved.

Ald. McCausland's proposal to have an emergency hospital established in the west end was referred to Dr. Sheard.

Pavement Profits.
The rather surprising statement that the city has made a profit of \$100,000 in three years on pavements laid by the works department was made by the city engineer in recommending that after a pavement has been ten years down, the cost of repairs should be charged as a local improvement. The profit is the result of the 15 per cent. charge for contingencies and repairs.

The board couldn't agree on a policy and the proposal goes forward without a recommendation.

The Auto Question.
City Treasurer Coady asked for \$2250 with which to buy a new automobile for Paymaster Burton, the machine, a second-hand one, purchased for him three years ago, having become worn out. Controller Foster thought Mr. Burton could use one of the reserve autos, and the property commissioner will report on the situation.

It was decided to pay Mrs. Agnes Ward of 94 Roxboro-avenue her claim of \$800 for an accident last June, when she was run down by a city auto driven by Arthur Rust of the works department. The board, however, thought that as Mr. Rust, who is a brother of the city engineer, was the driver he should show cause why he should not personally foot the bill. The physician's fees in the case were \$800.

Track Elevation.
The railway commission will be asked to order the elevation of the railway tracks at Yonge-street, Avenue-road and other points in the north end. The city engineer has heard that the tracks could be raised ten feet without serious inconvenience to the railways.

The board approved the salary increases which result from the adoption of the city engineer's recommendation of last year, but the assessment commissioner's recommendation that Leonard Smith and Ben. Leigh, who have reached the \$1000 limit of their grade,

Snow Cleaning.

Chief of Police Grasett suggests that the city undertake to keep all sidewalks free of ice and snow, as the enforcement of the bylaw compelling citizens to perform the duty individually has been difficult. The chief, Dr. Sheard and City Engineer Rust will confer.

Dr. Sheard will ask \$15,000 with which to buy horses for street-cleaning,

thus removing the necessity for hiring the animals. He wanted \$25,000 last year, but owing to street-cleaning and the purchase of auto sprinklers, not so many horses are now needed.

MRS. MORSE WILL FIGHT FOR HUSBAND'S FREEDOM.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Mrs. Clara Morse opened an office in the finan-

cial district to-day whence she will conduct a double campaign, first to procure the pardon of her husband, serving a fifteen year sentence in the federal prison at Atlanta, second, to rebuild as far as possible the shattered fortune. The office is a modest, two room affair, furnished with articles taken from the Morse home.

Mrs. Morse began to-day putting in circulation blank petitions asking President Taft for Morse's pardon.

MEAT PRICES WILL GO HIGHER

People Should Be Educated to Eating Cheaper Cuts.

DENVER, Col., Jan. 12.—Harold Swift of Swift & Co., in discussing the cost of living, said:

"Prices of meat are very high now, but there is every indication that they will be still higher. This is attributable to the high price of corn and the consequent scarcity of live stock.

"As long as the scarcity continues it is well to educate people to use the cheaper cuts of meat. These cheaper cuts are just as good and more wholesome if properly cooked."

Mr. Swift admitted that the retail dealer is making a large gross profit on meat.

Means Dearer Shoes.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—High cost of meat reduces consumption and increases the cost of hides and leather, and hence of shoes, is the conclusion, according to President John H. Hanan of the National Association of Boot and Shoe Manufacturers, in his report to-day to the annual convention.

Train Wreck, Many Hurt.

VINCENNES, Ind., Jan. 12.—A passenger train on the Vanalia Railroad, southward, was wrecked three miles north of here. Many persons were hurt, none fatally. A truck under the tender of the locomotive broke and the coaches rolled down the embankment.

Killed by Nitro-Glycerine.

FRANKLIN, Pa., Jan. 12.—Three men were killed and a team of horses blown to atoms when a nitroglycerine magazine at Brandon's Ferry exploded to-day. A horse across the Allegheny River from the magazine was totally wrecked.
