Canada's determination to employ all her resources to the uttermost in the war, is a fact which cannot be denied.

Mr. Wilfrid Laurier on rising to second the motion spoke with unforced fervor and eloquence. He hailed Mr. Balfour as the representative of England and paid a splendid tribute to the motherland. "Tell them in England," he said, "that we are proud of our British allegiance today more than ever before."

When Sir Wilfrid concluded, Hon. Dr. Pugsley called for three cheers for Mr. Balfour. After they were given, Mr. Laurier again spoke and the house adjourned.

Balfour Deeply Stirred.

When the applause which greeted the rising of Mr. Balfour died away, he briefly responded to the addresses of the two speakers in French, reading slowly from a memorandum in his hand.

"Gentlemen," he said, "I have come to the conclusion that we are today even prouder of our British allegiance than we were before."

in a national government. He said:

"Democracy's Difficulties.

"Democracy is the only form of government, but it is not an easy form of government. It has inherent difficulties. It has always had them, it always will have them, and I am not sure that every nation is strong enough to surmount these difficulties. That the great countries that represent western civilization not only can overcome them but have largely overcome them already I think is assured but do not let us imagine that the task, however successfully it may have been accomplished up to the present time, is one which does not require our constant effort, lest where failure is easy, failure should occur."

"I conclude by conveying, as I am sure I may convey, the most earnest appreciation and thanks of the house for Mr. Balfour's message. I bid him goodnight in the work which still lies before him, and which he will carry out with the same back to these in the motherland and the sea the firm resolve and determination of the parliament, and people of this country to do our duty in this great war to the end, whatever it may be."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, after paying a grateful tribute to the distinguished visitor, said that Mr. Balfour would be himself the first to recognize that the occasion was not only a great personal one, but to him as a representative of England.

England, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said, is a great country at all times; never greater than at this moment; never greater, I repeat, and because of the great efforts that are being made by the people of this country to support the cause of civilization and the cause of the motherland.

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
