

Ontario Mines and Smelters All Show Increase in Output

For First Three Months of Year It Amounted to
Million Dollars—Canada Only Country in World
Which Shows Increased Output of Gold.

Metalliferous mines, smelters and refining works of Ontario show, in the aggregate, an increase in the value of output for the first quarter of the year of nearly one million dollars over the corresponding quarter in 1919. Returns received by the Ontario Bureau of Mines for the three months ending March 31st, 1920, are tabulated below. For purposes of comparison the quantities and values are given for the corresponding period in 1919.
