BELT LINE FERRY SERVICE

Proposal to Inaugurate a System Like That of Detroit.

Ald. Church, who has probably more practical and better knowledge of harbor and navigation matters and needs than any other member of the city council, will bring before the meeting of the island committee on Monday next, a proposal to establish a belt line ferry service, which will not only be a boon to island residents, but of even greater benefit to citizens, as with a stop-off privilege they can visit all parts of the harbor and island for the same fare. This system works well at Detroit, where the boats run on a belt line to Belle Isle and are crowded at nights. The proposal is the only practical suggestion to ensure a reduction of fares to the island. To ensure the success of this improvement it will be necessary to dredge the south shore of the harbor somewhat, and to erect the necessary work on the new city hydraulic dredge, for which specifications are now ready. The city has a new dock at Yonge-street, and the belt line would include a start at Yonge-street, Brock-street, Hamilton-street, Ward's, St. Lawrence Park, Parliament, George-street, and vice versa. In Detroit such a service is of immense benefit to the public, as they can thus spend the evening on the boats for one fare.

LABEL LAW AT FAULT.

Illegally Exhumed Child's Body.

An odd point of law is involved in the application of the Ontario Burial Act, Niagara Falls, who asks the divisional court to reverse Chancellor Boyd's judgment in an action against the municipality. She bought a lot in the town cemetery, which was duly consecrated. A child was buried there, in mistake the lot was re-consecrated and the remains were exhumed and re-buried in the potter's field. After a year had passed Mrs. McNulty discovered the occurrence. Her demand for re-interment in the original lot was granted, but the claim for damages was dismissed on the ground that it was an unauthorized action on the part of an employee. In appealing it is contended that grave-digging is authorized work.

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INDUSTRY OF STEEL AND IRON

Description of Magnificent Plant of Northern Iron and Steel Co. at Collingwood.

The condition of the iron and steel trade all over the world is at present attracting considerable attention. In Europe the leading steel and iron manufacturers are in agreement as to the agreement whereby the tonnage is distributed between the various works and prices maintained. The export trade is also divided up between the various countries; each mill receiving its proper allotment.

The same condition, to a large extent, obtained in Canada. The next four years will see a great era of railroad building and renewal of the rolling mills. The steel and iron industry have to be built, and cars and locomotives, and thousands of tons of steel will go to the construction of the new lines that it will take at least 200 tons daily to supply the needs of the manufacturers of great quantities of steel.

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
