WALKED STRAIGHT INTO A WELL DEATH

Freeman Leaman, a Deaf Mute, Killed on the I. C. R. This Morning Near Penobscus Station --- He Walked Straight Into Locomotive.

SUSSEX, N. B., June 26.—(Special)—At 5:20 o'clock this morning, two miles west of Penobscus, Freeman Leaman, a deaf mute, was struck and instantly killed by J. W. Cole's westbound military train.
