Scriptures issued to this Branch 39 Bibles, 60 Testaments— 99 Total.

10. WELLINGTON.—In this village a Depot was established in the month of August, and placed under the care of Mr. Henry Phillips. When the deputation, Capt. Wright and the Home Secretary, visited Wellington in November, they found that during the three months of its trial 88 copies had been sold. On consulting with the friends they thought it desirable to have a Branch established, and accordingly a public meeting was called, and a promising one formed on the 25th November, 1852.
