Hints for the Cook

Raspberry Sponge

Sweeten well 2½ cups of raspberry juice and bring to a boil. Add half a package of soaked gelatin, stirring until dissolved. When cool but not set, fold in the whites of three eggs beaten until stiff. Beat until thick. Mold, chill and serve with whipped cream.

Rice Muffins

Two cups of cold boiled rice, 2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon of salt, 1 teaspoon of sugar, 1½-2 teaspoons of baking powder, 2 cups milk and 3 eggs. Dilute the rice, made free from lumps, with milk and beaten eggs; sift together flour, sugar, salt and baking powder; add to rice preparation. Mix into smooth, rather firm batter. Muffin pan to be cold and well greased, then fill 2-3 full. Bake in a hot oven fifteen minutes.

Preserving Berries Without Boiling

In preserving currants or berries of tender substances, like red raspberries or strawberries, do not boil. Fill the jars in layers of granulated sugar and fruit, fill

up well and seal tight and let them stand over night, then set in a vessel of cold water, put on the back of range, and let the cold water slowly heat up to a boiling point. Remove covers before putting in water. Take from fire and leave fruit jars in the water until cold again, but do not cover up to steam. Screw on tops when cold. Even if, after removing your sugar is not all dissolved in the jar, the fruit will keep well, color and flavor will be perfect and the fruit-unbroken.

Dutch Apple Pie

Line a pie dish with good paste and fill with sliced tart apples. Blend 1 teaspoonful of flour and a little cinnamon with 1 cupful of sugar and pour over apples together with a few drops of rose flavoring, if liked. Over all pour ¾ of a cupful of thick cream either sweet or only slightly sour. Bake with 1 crust only and serve while fresh.

Notes of Plays and Players on Board and Screen

GRACE GEORGE TO MANAGE HOUSE

Mary Manning May Return; Paul Gilmore in Pictures; Frank Powell as Producer; Grace Goodall in West; Various Items of Green Room and Studio

Grace George, (Mrs. William A. Brady) who has visited St. John at different times, will actively assume the direction of her own theater in New York, the Playhouse, during the coming fall and winter. Miss George will be in complete control, according to an announcement made by Mr. Brady selecting her own plays, choosing her players and making all productions under her own personal direction.

"When I built the Playhouse," says Mr. Brady, "I had in mind the formation of a permanent acting company upon the line adopted by the late Augustin Daly at Daly's Theatre and subsequently by Daniel Frohman at the old Lyceum. This organization was to have been led by Miss George, who had recently registered a most exceptional success in 'Divorcée' at London and other as Lady Teazle in the revival of 'The School for Scandal' at the New Theatre in New York.

"Indeed, this was the chief animating purpose that carried the Playhouse to completion, and may be recalled as a tentative announcement in this direction was issued at the time of the opening. But while the plan was developing 'Bought and Paid For' was produced with such success that to have withdrawn it would have been an act of business madness, and following this play 'Little Women' carried the theatre to completion, and its second year, compelling the temporary abandonment of the project.

"Several plays, however, has its compensating feature, since it has enabled the final placing of the underlying upon a foundation of absolute financial security eliminating all possible anxiety of that score and enabling Miss George to have complete freedom from any possible letters in the fulfillment of her artistic aims.

"Several plays have already been selected for the season's series. Of these several are new, we have seen in the past a number of revivals. One point of significance is that no production will receive a second performance, while those most in demand will be repeated on single nights during the season.

"The offerings decided upon at this time include a Moliere comedy, a play by John Galsworthy, a comedy by Bernard Shaw, a comedy by Pinero 'The New York Idea', by Langdon Mitchell, 'The Lions' by H. M. Jones, 'The School for Scandal', two recent successes from the Comedie Francaise and one classical play in addition to two new works by American authors.

Thomas Paul Gilmore's advent into pictures has resulted in an unexpected success. He cannot be called a success just at present whether he prefers to remain in the silent drama or go to the stage at the head of his own company. His work with the Pathe-Balboa Company was received with great success when he produced the well-known pictures, 'The Shrine of Happiness', 'Pawns of the War God', and 'The Idol of Paris'.

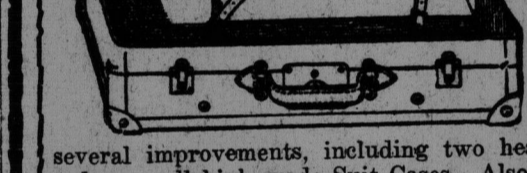
