mitted by contamination. Therefore, he argues, the proper way to prevent contagion is not to suppress the causes of contamination, but eradicate spontaneous development of the disease.

He reaches the conclusion that the original sources of most diseases exist in man's daily food, but that contamination by foodstuffs is very rare. Food is only dangerous when mildewed or rotten.

Dr. Tissot does not put forth the claim that he has found a remedy for these diseases, but maintains that in the light of his experiments certain epidemics might be forestalled, such as cholera, by destroying poisonous mushrooms in the woods and diphtheria by supressing barley from children's diet and avoiding the use of barley straw in cow stables.
