has had fifty-three years of service in
the Methodist church.

**NO SCHOOL TAX
LEGISLATION**

Toronto, March 15.—The government
of the province of Ontario has no in-
tention of introducing legislation at the
present session looking to revision of the
act regarding the division of corporation
school taxes, as requested by the sepa-
rate school authorities.

This was the reply given by Premier
Drury today to a denunciation of the
Catholic educational council.

Mr. Drury declared, however, that the
government was ready to co-operate with
the council in the preparation of a
stated case, for submission to the courts.

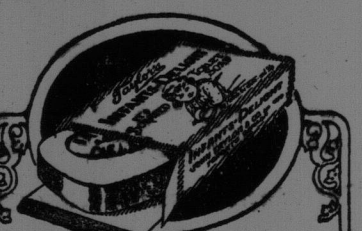
