### KILLS HIS GIRL COMPANION AND SELF ON SHIP

**Fearful End to Elopement of New York Merchant, a Married Man.**

Bridgetown, Barbados, March 16.—Louis Campagna, a passenger on the S. S. Vasari, bound to Buenos Aires from York, killed a woman on the evening of March 10, and then committed suicide, was learned on arrival of the steamer here yesterday. He fired five bullets into her. The bodies were buried at sea.

New York, March 16.—The double tragedy aboard the S. S. Vasari in which Louis Campagna shot and killed his companion and then committed suicide, was the climax of an elopement which his wife and children revealed at their home in Brooklyn last night.

The members of the dead man's family, some of whom knew of his fascination for the young woman, half his age, who accompanied him, were preparing a funeral reception for the erring husband and father when news of the tragedy reached them.

The dead merchant's daughter, Virginia, twenty years old, said the girl her father had slain was Vivian Dressel, whom he met two years ago. The daughter declared she tried to induce her father to give up the girl, but unsuccessfully. "We could not stop it," she said.

Campagna, who was a prosperous merchant, left home on January 8, so Virginia said, and never returned.

**AGAINST GENERAL M'LEAN ON BOARD**  
Winnipeg G. W. V. A. Meeting Does Not Want Him on Re-establishment Committee.

Winnipeg, March 16.—A resolution protesting against the appointment of Brigadier-General M'Lean to the re-establishment committee and demanding that he immediately be called upon to resign, was passed at a meeting of the Winnipeg branch of the Great War Veterans' Association held last night.

During the meeting a long discussion took place on the question of vocational training, especially in relation to a statement in a despatch from Ottawa that seventy per cent. of those vocationally trained had found positions in industry. This was characterized as a "misstatement."

**WITNESS HEARD SCREAMS AND SAW PERSONS NEAR SCENE**  
At yesterday's session of the trial of William St. Pierre, charged with the murder of Miss Minnie Stevens, Henri Sylvain testified that at the time he heard screams coming from the scene of the crime he saw three or four persons walking along Emerson street close to where the tragedy occurred. The defence is making strong efforts to connect two strangers in an automobile with the crime. Madame St. Pierre, mother of the accused, was on the stand yesterday and told of her son coming into the house on that fatal night, but did not hear him go out again. The following morning she pressed the clothes he had on the night of the crime, and she swore that there were no blood stains on them. Leo Gillespie, manager of the Royal hotel at the time of the crime, was placed on the stand and could not swear that the room taken by the two strangers was occupied on the night of the tragedy. Francis St. Pierre, brother of the prisoner, was examined, but was not allowed to give evidence of conversation between the accused and himself after the body was found. Louis Michaud gave evidence concerning the two strangers in the automobile. Miss Evelyn St. Onge testified that she had seen the two men come for gasoline to the store where she worked. She remembered them by the old car which they drove. Miss
