

Reasons for Loyalty and Patriotism

Advancing what he maintained were several reasons why Great Britain should be honored and respected and appealing to his audience to show their loyalty and imperial spirit by living the best life possible and to attack the problems of reconstruction in a spirit of brotherhood, co-operation and mutual confidence. Rev. H. A. Goodwin addressed a meeting under the auspices of the Canadian Imperial League in the Queen Square Theatre yesterday afternoon. Incidentally, Mr. Goodwin said that if the United States had remained a part of the British Empire the late war would not have occurred. He said that only by basing national and individual life on the principles of the Bible could Canada become a great, patriotic and loyal nation. If there had been a mistake made in regard to suffering Ireland, the speaker said, it had been a mistake of judgment, not of intent. Every nation that trod the path of injustice and dishonor, he said, had gone down but the British Empire was still strong and virile, her navy supreme upon the seas, her army the fear of her enemies and her national integrity and honor the pride of her subjects and the fear and envy of her enemies. If Great Britain had been unjust to Ireland, the speaker said, this injustice would have weakened her, whereas, on the contrary, she was strong and obtaining greater honor than ever before. The speaker said that in conversation with a friend a short time ago he had been told that the United States would have escaped many calamities if they had remained loyal to the British Empire.

The war of 1912 would have been avoided and the Civil War with its loss of 600,000 lives and more than \$3,000,000,000 in money would not have taken place, for the slaves would have been freed as they were thirty years before in British possessions.

Last of all, the speaker said, the great world war would have been avoided for Germany would never have dared to attack if she thought she would have to face the united Anglo-Saxon races of the world.

P. L. Potts, in moving a vote of thanks to the speaker, which was seconded by D. Hipwell, said that he thought it would be a good thing if the auditoriums of the city were opened on Sunday afternoons for the discussion of social and labor problems and of methods to relieve the distress of those who were living under hard conditions.

C. Robinson, president of the Canadian Imperial League, who acted as chairman, said that the meeting had not been called as an indignation meeting against

the Self-Determination League. The only qualification demanded for membership in the Imperial League was to stand up for the empire, he said. Among those on the platform were Commissioner J. B. Jones, F. L. Potts, G. Armstrong, F. E. Flewelling, H. L. McGowan, E. Day, D. Hipwell and W. J. Brown.

The holder quartette sang three selections during the course of the programme.

VISITING CLERGY IN CITY PULPITS

Several visiting preachers were heard in the city churches yesterday. Rev. James Cardwell, of Richibucto, delivered the sermon at the choral celebration of Holy Communion in St. Paul's church in the morning and was the preacher in Trinity church in the evening. Rev. A. J. Patstone, of Grand Falls, was the preacher at the evening service in St. Paul's church. Rev. W. B. Williston, of West China, gave the sermon at both morning and evening service in St. Luke's church.

Rev. Dr. W. Farquharson conducted the morning service in the First Presbyterian church, West St. John, and the evening service was conducted by Rev. George Scott. Owing to ill-health, Rev. Dr. J. Morison, minister of the First Presbyterian church, has been unable to conduct the services of his church for three weeks. His friends are glad to know that Dr. and Mrs. Morison, who also has been ill, are both making satisfactory progress towards recovery.

St. Matthew's church, Rev. Frank Baird, clerk of the St. John Presbytery, conducted both services.

The evening service in Centenary church yesterday was a particularly impressive one. Rev. Dr. Hill, field secretary for the Canadian Brotherhood Federation, was the preacher. The service was conducted by the pastor, Rev. H. A. Goodwin, and the singing was led by a male choir of forty-one men and boys directed by Wilfrid Lanyon. The singing was most effective. Dr. Hill spoke of the Brotherhood movement as it applied to the churches and the establishment of a brotherhood in a church for the purpose of some definite effect on every phase of life, social, political, moral, educational, etc. Besides the religious special music included a quartette "Crossing the Bar," beautifully sung by A. C. Smith, Mr. Charlton, Mr. Lanyon and George Lockhart, and the solo "The Lord is My Shepherd" sung by Mr. Lanyon. Miss Alice Hea was at the organ. There was a large congregation at the service.

In the absence of Rev. J. A. MacKellan, who is in Toronto attending meetings of two of the church boards, of which he is a member, Rev. Dr. W. C. Kelstead, of Fredericton, preached at both services in St. David's. In the morning he preached an eloquent and deeply practical sermon on the duty which devolved on church members to make their Christianity felt in all their contacts with the state, the business, the politics, social relations, amusements and recreation, should feel the influence of the church, and that every element in the daily life of a Christian community should be Christian in spirit as well as in name.

Rev. A. R. Yeoman took charge of the Mission church officially yesterday and sang the high celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

Thirtieth Anniversary. The people of the Tabernacle Baptist church commenced their celebration of the thirtieth anniversary of the founding of the church with special services yesterday. The preacher of the anniversary sermons was Rev. Wellington Camp of Campbellton, a former pastor of Lester Street Baptist church, and many of his friends were present to welcome him back to the city and to hear his splendid message. The unfavorable condition of the weather in some degree made the congregations smaller than they would have been otherwise, but those who attended the services were privileged to hear two heart-warming sermons. A the morning service Mr. Camp spoke from Isaiah viii, telling of the prophet's response to the vision and the call of God and that only as life sees God and feels His cleansing power will it fully rise up to follow His command. In the evening the preacher took as his text: "What is man that thou art mindful of him?"—Psalm viii:4. From this passage he brought the thought of man in relation to God's mighty creation. He spoke of what God had done for man in meeting and supplying his needs temporarily and through the great redemption wrought in Jesus Christ. The messages delivered will be long remembered.

Rev. Mr. Camp also addressed the Brotherhood and Sunshine classes every afternoon on the subject of Home.

May Succeed The Cardinal

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Rome, April 17.—According to reports in circulation at the Vatican the Most Rev. John Joseph Glennon, Archbishop of St. Louis, is the prelate who is most likely to succeed the late Cardinal Gibbons as Archbishop of Baltimore.

In addition to Archbishop Glennon, the Right Rev. William T. Russell, Bishop of Charleston (S. C.), is being talked of as the possible successor of Cardinal Gibbons.

PASTORAL BY MOST REV. PAUL BRUCHES

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Montreal, April 17.—In a pastoral addressed to all Roman Catholic churches in this city today Archbishop Bruches of the Montreal arch-diocese denounced feminine fashions, the dance "evil" and the cinematograph films and makes particular reference to the Young Men's Christian Association as a "special danger."

Of the latter His Grace says: "Under color of bringing light to young people these associations turn them away from the magistrum of the church constituted by God, the torch of truth, and

incite them to demand each only for his own conscience, and then at the narrow seat of human reason, the light which shall guide them." This, the Archbishop asserts, leads finally to a "vague and undecided religion which has absolutely nothing in common with the religion preached by Jesus Christ."

The pastoral adds that it is the duty of young people of both sexes to avoid such associations.

BURGLARS BUSY AT SANDY POINT AGAIN

Several cottages in the summer colony at the Sandy Point Beach were broken into, supposedly by two men, on Friday afternoon last. Property was taken from several of the houses and all of them were generally upset.

It was reported last night that K. Pederson, who owns a cottage at the beach and who lives about two miles out on the Sandy Point Road, saw two men coming towards the city on Friday afternoon carrying two suit cases which he recognized as ones he left in his summer home. He accosted the men and accused them of taking his suit-cases, whereupon they dropped them and made off into the woods.

When opened, the suit cases were found to contain clothing and other property which had been taken from the beautiful summer home of L. R. Ross at the Sandy Point.

D. Colgan, who owns a house at the beach, visited his place yesterday, on hearing of the break, and found that some bed-clothing and dishes had been taken.

Similar losses were reported by another property owner at the River, Mrs. G. Porter, whose home had been broken into for the third time this winter. Cottages belonging to Frank Best, H. Farmer, F. Hamm, W. H. Golding and Mrs. H. H. Pickett also were entered, but the extent of the damage or theft if any done at these places could not be ascertained last night.
