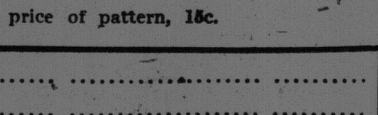

quires as much care, if not more, than the construction. The outer front, back and sleeve are laid on an open width of the batiste, along a lengthwise thread.

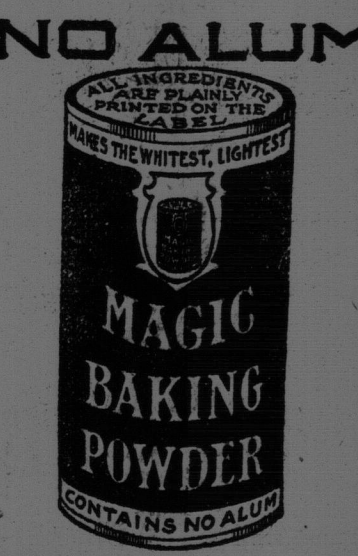
An unusually pretty blouse in abasine batiste, having a vest of all-over lace and sleeves cut in one piece.

Twenty feet long and fitted on each side with ten bicycle seats, with pedals, cranks and chains below, the motive power being exercised by the travelers themselves.

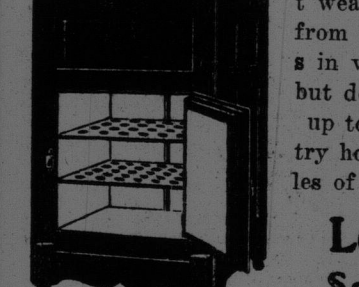
Experiments show that a speed of twenty miles an hour can easily be attained, while the price charged is only a quarter of the usual rate.

If the innovation be successful, even the main lines purpose to allow full-speed trains thus equipped to leave Paris during the holiday period.

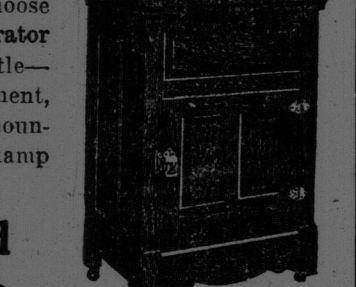
