FORGOT TO WRITE

Minister's Statement at Labor Congress—The Officers Elected

The matter of the strike of the mine workers on Vancouver Island was threshed out yesterday afternoon at the session of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, St. Andrew's Hotel, Robert Foster, of Cumberland, B. C., argued that the miners had not been well treated by the department of labor. F. Ferrington, vice-president of the International Mine Workers made a vigorous attack on Mr. Crothers' department in connection with the strike. The minister of labor replied, defending his position, though in answer to one of Mr. Ferrington's statements he said that "he had simply forgotten to write to the men in the matter."

The election of officers was then taken under the honorary presidency of M. M. Donoghue, the American fraternal delegate. For the post of president, J. C. Watters, was on the proposal of Fred Hest (St. John), unanimously re-elected. Other popular re-elections were those of Fred Bancroft for the vice-presidency of the congress, and of P. M. Draper for that of secretary-treasurer.

The following provincial vice-presidents were elected: Nova Scotia, J. T. Joy; Quebec, J. T. Foster; Ontario, James Watt; Manitoba, R. A. Riggs; Saskatchewan, William McAllister.

For the executive committees the following were elected: Quebec—L. L'Esperance, N. Arcand and John Wall.

Nova Scotia—Henry Gregory, Sydney; J. Sutherland, Amherst; and J. McIntyre, Sydney.

Ontario—W. Driscoll, Kingston; J. Gibbins, Toronto; J. W. Ripley, Hamilton.

Manitoba—R. Rember, W. Renton and F. W. McGill.

Saskatchewan—J. B. Judson, J. D. Wallace and W. E. Cox.

Delegate to the American conference, Alderman R. A. Riggs, Winnipeg.

Two cities were nominated for the scope of the 1916 convention, Vancouver and St. Catharines (Ont.). A splendid fight on behalf of Vancouver was made by Delegate Trotter, with the result that the voting was: For Vancouver, 67; for St. Catharines, 42.

In the Imperial Theatre last evening, beginning at ten o'clock, an enjoyable smoker was held for the entertainment of the visiting delegates at the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. A fine programme was given, consisting of motion pictures, music, songs and sketches. Those taking part were Arthur Huskins, Tommy Stack, Mr. Dupluis, F. McInnes, R. Harding, and the P. and L. quartette, Messrs. Simpson, Bancroft, Riggs and McClelland. Bayard Stillwell presided.
